FOREST FIRES IN 1921 EXPENSIVE; COST \$16 SECOND

 SPOKANE, Wash., April 25.—Over sixteen dollars a second is what forest fires cost the United States during 1921, declared Franklin Girard of Coeur D'Alene, in Spokane recently making arrangements for the observance of "Anti-Fire Week," April 22 to 28.

"Annually the forest fires of this country destroy enough material to build five-room houses every 100 feet on both sides of the road extending from New York to Chicago. More than 140,000 forest fires have occurred in the United States in the past five years. More than 50,000,000 acres of timber were burned in the past five years. This area is greater than the area of Washington and Idaho combined.

"Forest protection goes hand in hand with national prosperity," Mr. Girard said. "Without wood there can be no agriculture, no manufacturing, no commerce. Forest fires destroy life and property, impoverish the soil, drive away animals, cause floods and drought, and lay waste to the playgrounds of the people."

Eighty per cent of the forest fires are due to human agencies, according to Mr. Girard. If this needless waste were stopped and the material thus saved put into houses, the various business interests concerned in construction work would benefit to the extent of more than \$100,000,000 annually," he said.

NEW FIRE ENGINE

 EUGENE, Ore., April 25.—A gasoline fire engine, weighing but 100 pounds, but having power, according to its inventor and forest officials, to throw a good stream of water through 1500 feet of two-inch hose, will be used in fighting fires in the Cascade national forests east of Eugene this summer, according to an announcement of Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor.

On account of its light weight it may be carried anywhere in the mountains by two men or on horseback. As there are few places in the Cascade forest except on the summit where there are no streams of water available in case of fire, the forest officials express the belief that the engine will assist materially in reducing the loss by fire this year.
