U. S. DISPENSARY IN SAMOAN ISLANDS

PAGO PAGO, American Samoa, April 25.—An additional dispensary has been built for the Samoans of American Samoa by the health department of the island government. Island officials state that men planning to buy land and establish a plantation with any expectation of a profitable issue from the venture, considering the labor conditions and the impossibility of getting suitable tracts of land, is doomed to failure.

Turner, Mrs. Percy Pennington, Anna, Stevie Richardson, editor of Woman's Home Companion, and Ida Clyde Clarke, of the Pictorial Review.

Although the delegates will be chiefly occupied with federation business of importance, the social side is not to be forgotten, according to plans announced by Mrs. B. M. Boykin, president of the Atlanta Women's club and official hostess to the convention, and Mrs. Altona Richardson, chairman of arrangements. Social events already planned include a "typical southern breakfast" a garden party on the lawn of the Atlanta Women's club, a trip to Stone Mountain and a concert at its base, visit to the home of the late Joel Chandler Harris, writer of the "Uncle Remus" stories, and to the Cyclorama to view the 10,000 painting of the battle of Atlanta, a banquet to visiting press representatives and other functions.

The Atlanta Women's club's new auditorium-theater, costing \$125,000, has just been completed and a banquet hall to cost \$100,000 will be finished in time to be used to entertain the delegates and visitors. The Atlanta club has a membership of 1,400 and regards its plant as one of the finest in the country.

General sessions of the convention will be held in the auditorium at the Baptist tabernacle.

Erring Citizens Are Now Given An Opportunity To Study Laws They Violate

(By Associated Press)
 SPOKANE, Wash., April 25.—A woman was the first student in Judge Fred H. Wirt's traffic school, established here recently. Arrested on a charge of parking overtime, she confessed ignorance of traffic ordinances and was sent into an adjoining room to study. Half an hour later she returned and answered all the questions of the court satisfactorily.

The new plan will not supplant the system of fining traffic violators, but will work to cut down the number of second offenses, in the opinion of Judge Wirt. A room beside the court room is used for the school and violators are given a printed copy of traffic rules for a textbook and after several minutes study are given a chance to answer orally questions on traffic laws.

"That, I believe, will cause people brought into court to study the laws and know them, so that future arrests will not be necessary," said Judge Wirt. "Many traffic laws are willfully violated, and the school will not check these, but it should materially reduce the number of arrests due to lack of knowledge of traffic laws."
