Traffic Man Named—William Osborn has been appointed highway traffic officer by County Judge Dodson. Judge Dodson stated that the traffic laws pertaining to the highways would be strictly enforced and that "speed hounds" road hogs, gliding lights and so forth would receive special attention from the new officer. The law specifies the speed limit at 30 miles per hour; that cars must give a portion of the right of way in passing and that lights must be dimmed. Several near accidents have been reported and with the good weather coming on accidents are inevitable unless the traffic laws are obeyed.—Baker Herald.

WORK TO BEGIN ON MCKAY DAM BEFORE LONG, ANNOUNCED

PENDLETON, April 26.—Camps will be laid out and first work started on the construction of the site of the McKay creek storage dam in a week, H. M. Conner, engineer in charge of the construction work for the big irrigation project declared last night. Just when actual construction of the dam and dam wall will start is still a matter of conjecture, according to Engineer Conner, who thinks that most of the preliminary work will be out of the way by late summer and that the main work will be in swing by September. Engineer Conner, with his family arrived here Monday night, and the engineer in charge will spend the next few days looking over the site for the \$2,000,000 structure, when he will determine just what machinery will be needed for the first part of the work.

BLUE MOUNTAIN ROAD NOW OPEN

So Says Lee L. Shannon, Umatilla County Roadmaster, at Pendleton Today.

PENDLETON, Apr. 26.—The Old Oregon Trail is open, and cars are now able to cross the five-mile piece of dirt road bed where construction is under way. It became known today when a report from the contractor to Lee L. Shannon, county roadmaster, was made. The road has been full of mud-holes and has been a real problem to those trying to cross the mountains. It had become impassable at the end of last week when snow and rain again soaked it up until some of the holes were too deep for a car to get along under its own power. If the weather stays good, no further difficulty is anticipated for drivers who want to make the trip over the Blue mountains.
