SHEEP COMING INTO THE PARK

THE PARK, Apr. 26.—Clarence Vanorder, in the way of diversification, between times of work, is breaking some fine horses which is the main power used on the ranch. Clarence is a "cracker jack" in handling bronchos, as he was really raised in the saddle, like most all of the Park kids.

The renting of the various grass plots suitable for sheep grazing, held by individual owners is in evidence by the sheep men, who range their sheep on the National forest reserve, close to this community.

Jack Hunter has rented his pasturage to Ed Miller of Union.

Oscar Jacobson of North Powder rents the pasture on the old Hubble and Brown places from Stonedahl and Davis of Union, who are the agents of said land. The sheep usually come on these places about the first of May.

Jones and Lee of North Powder, who have a couple of bands of sheep, supposed to be leased under option, from Oscar Jacobson, generally occupy the range close to Clarence Vanorder, extending across the Lick creek, Black Pine Springs, and the south fork of Catherine creek. They

are expected to come about May 15.

John Miles of Big Creek takes a band of sheep on his leased pasture back of Cougar Rock and Badger Flat, then on through Hunter's place at the Forks on the Forest Reserve allotment next to Miller's, close to China Cap.

Charles Howell from Eagle Valley, comes through here with a band of sheep also ranging in that territory, close to China Cap and Back creek.

Steiger Brothers, from Baker, will move their sheep to this part of the country soon. Their range extends to the Big Minam river across Sand Pass, back of China Cap.

In a few weeks it will be good-bye to the swift running deer who is now on the alert for men and dogs, sheep and cattle, who destroy their natural food. They will go to the upper

mountains, picking out places not frequented by man.

The grasses are in better condition than for many years previous, but soon will be eaten to the roots, leaving nothing but dust.

Gardening is the order of the day all along the Creek and the Park. Some are nearly done, while others are just beginning. But by all evidences there will be an abundant supply of garden truck, according to the size of the planting in progress.
