PLAN STREET IMPROVEMENT

BAKER, Apr. 21.—Improvement of streets and sidewalks in the northwestern part of Baker was authorized by the city commission in session today. The cost was estimated by the city engineer at \$136 for each front foot, to be divided between sidewalk construction at 99 cents and street repaving at 37 cents. The proposed improvements will be completed within 10 days, the commissioners voted, and property owners will have an opportunity to file remonstrances.

"BROKEN CHAINS" MAKES DECIDED HIT AT STAR

Picture patrons here had an opportunity at the Star theatre last night of seeing the photoplay made from the \$10,000 prize winning scenario, "Broken Chains," in the great scenario contest conducted by the Chicago Daily News early in the year. MOVE ON BILL MAY FAIL.
SALEM, Apr. 28.—Referendum of the so-called oleomargarine law enacted at the last session of the Oregon legislature will not be possible at the special election to be held next November. This was the opinion expressed here today by a number of attorneys who have examined the bill authorizing the special election.

The law passed by the legislature last January providing for the special election on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1923, sets out explicitly that only revenue measures shall be referred. Attorneys agree that the proposed referendum of the oleomargarine law does not come within the scope of the act.
