Producers Union expects to be in the county next week to take personal charge of the work. A group of local business men have clubbed together to take over a forty acre tract of land on the C. A. Hunter ranch. This piece, which lies west of the Jim Tulley house, is ploughed and is ideal for growing of head lettuce. Cyrus Johnson will be in charge of the tract, and will start next week on getting the land in shape for planting.—Wallowa Sun.

Washington Conditions Good—W. L. Evans, known to his friends in Union county as "Leo" Evans, arrived in La Grande from Asotin, Washington, where he is the owner of a large stock farm, and is spending the day here on business. "Conditions look very promising in the district surrounding Asotin," Mr. Evans stated. Mr. Evans was formerly located near Union.

Catch Many Fish—Menchum creek and the north fork of the Umatilla yielded a big catch of fish to two local anglers Thursday. Sol Baum and Guy Matlock were the successful fishermen. They are showing 42 nice trout and white fish in the window of Baum's Sporting Goods store as a result of their visit up the mountain. The three white fish are about 10 inches each. A remarkable incident on the trip was the landing by Mr. Baum of a six-pound steelhead with a fly hook.—Pendleton Tribune.

Sturgills In Portland—R. A. and N. C. Sturgill, road contractors of La Grande, were here yesterday to transact business and stopped at the Imperial hotel. They said that conditions in their section of the state are improving rapidly and that a much better feeling is being experienced by all lines, due for the most part to excellent crop prospects.—Oregonian.

400 Acres Head Lettuce—A trial of the head lettuce project is now assured in this valley, and the contracts with the Idaho Producers Union for an acreage of about four hundred acres will be sent into that organization soon. High Valley Wants Roads—UNION, Apr. 28.—A delegation of High Valley residents consisting of Edgar Wilkinson, Arch Burford, Wm. Barford and Richard Linsley, was present and asked the aid of the commercial club in securing from the county sufficient funds each year to keep the road up Little Creek and the road in High Valley in passable condition. There are 1000 acres of grain in High Valley, and about 2,500 cords of wood are hauled from that section to the Grande Grande each year, to say nothing of much other traffic over the route. The petitioners recite that whereas, they used to have \$1,000 a year for

these roads, they now get about \$300, which is insufficient, and taxes are higher than they used to be. They want help. A committee consisting of Tony D. Smith, C. L. Caldwell and M. S. Levy was appointed to investigate the matter and see if there is not some way that High Valley can secure the needed assistance.

NOTICE OF HEARING ON PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Commission of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, proposes and intends to improve District No. 123 in the City of La Grande, Oregon, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor heretofore adopted by the Commission, and that the report of the committee on estimates for said improvement is now on file in the office of the Recorder of the City of La Grande, Oregon; that the said Commission has set Wednesday, the 10th day of May, 1923, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., of said day, at the Commission Room in the City building in La Grande, Oregon, as the time and place when and where said Commission will meet and hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievance of any persons against said proposed improvement and the proposed assessment therefor against the property to be benefited thereby in said district.

That the boundaries of the district to be improved and benefited by the said proposed improvement as finally adopted by the Commission are as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point on the center line of Adams Avenue 212.9 feet northwest from the center line of Hemlock Street; thence at right angles to said center line in a northeasterly direction to the center of the alley in Block 110, Chaplin's Addition to the City of La Grande; thence in an easterly direction to the most southerly corner of Lot 6, said Block 110; thence in a northeasterly direction along the lot line between Lots 6 and 7, said Block 110, to the southerly line of Jefferson Avenue; thence in a northeasterly direction to the most southerly corner of lot 7, Block 117, Chaplin's Addition to the City of La Grande; thence in a northeasterly direction following the lot line between lots 7 and 8, said Block 117, and its extension to the center line of the O. W. R. & N. Company's main line right of way; thence on a curve to the right following the center line of the O. W. R. & N. Company's right of way commonly called the Joseph Branch to the City Limits; thence south along the east City limits to the center line of Q Avenue; thence west along the center line of Q Avenue to a point opposite the lot line between lots 4 and 5, Block 22, Williamson's Addition to the City of La Grande; thence south at right angles following the aforesaid line between lots 4 and 5, said Block 22, to the center line of the alley in said block 22; thence west to the intersection with the northerly extension of the lot line between lots 6 and 7, Block 23, Williamson's Addition to the City of La Grande; thence south along the line between said lots 6 and 7, Block 23 and its extension to the center line of East Pennsylvania Avenue; thence west along the center line of East Pennsylvania Avenue to the center along the center line of Pine Street to the center line of the alley in Block 27, Williamson's Addition to the City of La Grande extended east; thence west along the center line of the alley and its extension in said Block 27 to the center line of North Maple Street; thence south along the center line of North Maple Street a distance of 63 feet; thence west at right angles to the west line of lot 8, Block 26, Williamson's Addition to the City of La Grande; thence south to the south west corner of said lot 8; thence in a southwesterly direction to a point in the southerly line of the O. W. R. & N. Company's right of way 41 feet north of the north line of Spruce Street; thence in a southwesterly direction to a point in the northerly line of Jefferson Avenue, said point being 103.85 feet north of the north line of Spruce Street; thence at right angles in a southwesterly direction to the center line of Jefferson Avenue; thence in a northwesterly direction along the center line of Jefferson Avenue to an intersection of the lot line between lots 2 and 3, Block 4, Cogran's Addition to the City of La Grande extended; thence in a southwesterly direction along the lot line between lots 2 and 3, Block 4, said Block 4 to the center line of Adams Avenue; thence in a northwesterly direction along center line of Adams Avenue to point of beginning.

That the said proposed improvement is the construction of a hard surface pavement, concrete sidewalks, combination concrete curbs and gutters, gutters where concrete curbs are in place, manholes, catch basins, monument frames and covers, etc., on Hemlock Street from the Northerly line of Adams Avenue to the southerly line of Jefferson Avenue and Jefferson Avenue from the westerly line of Hemlock Street to a line drawn at right angles to said Jefferson Avenue from the most westerly corner of Block 2, Cogran's Addition to the City of La Grande, Cove Avenue from the Northerly line of Jefferson Avenue to the southerly line of Island Avenue and Island Avenue from the north line of Cove Avenue to a connection with the present pavement at the east City boundary.
