TO INSTALL FRAT MEN ON MAY FIRST

(By Associated Press) STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Apr. 28.—Phi Kappa Sigma, national college fraternity, has granted a charter to embarkadero club a Stanford social organization formed in 1920. The new fraternity will be installed in San Francisco on May 1 and 2 under the guidance of the University of California, University of Washington, Nevada and eastern university chapter members.
