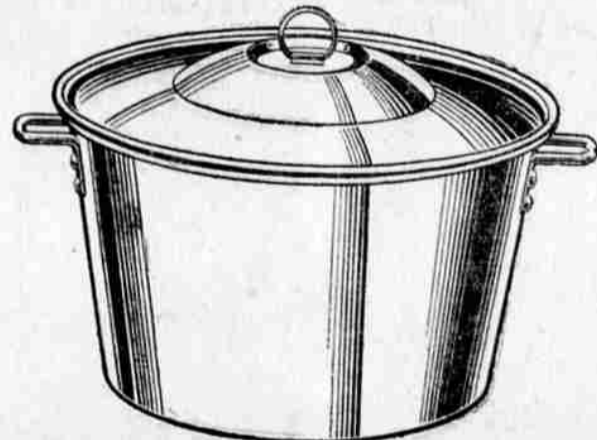
New Idea in Panels.

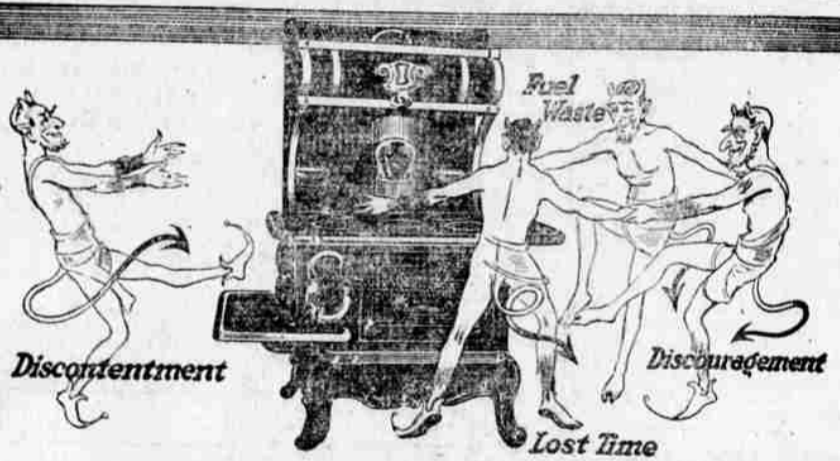

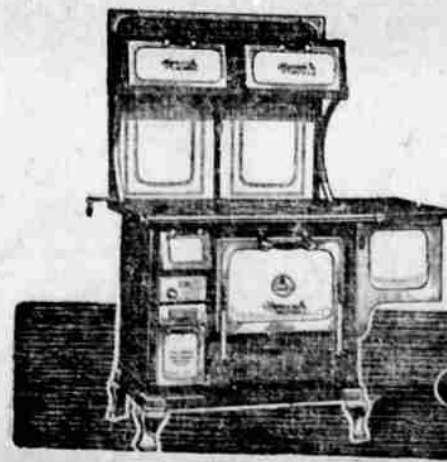
