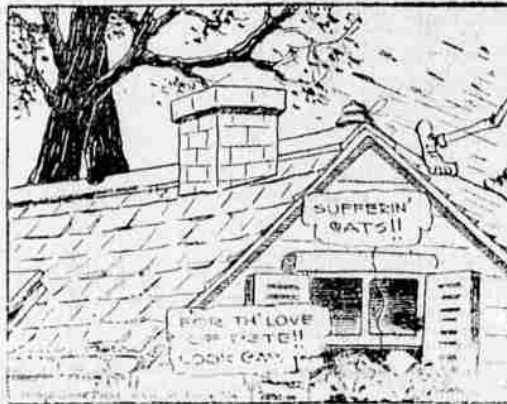
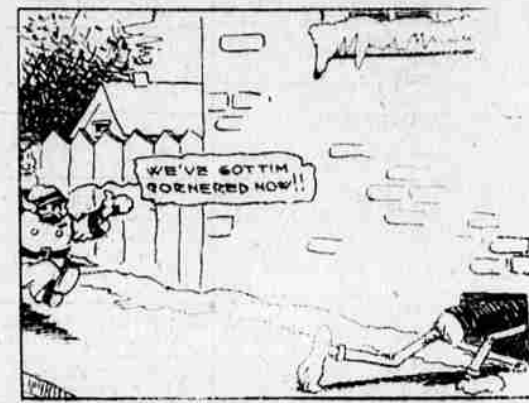
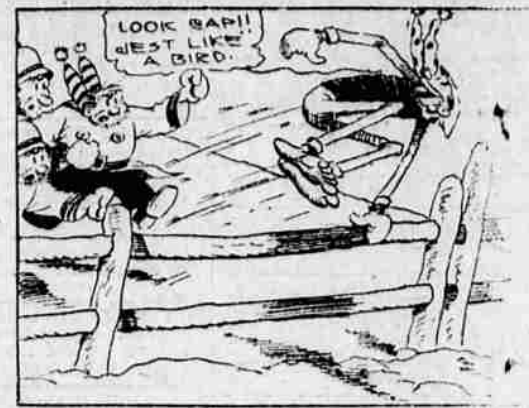
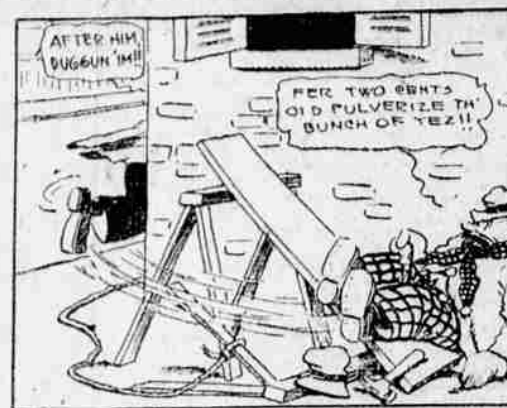




COVE STUDENTS PRESENT DRAMA
