IMBLER, May 2.—A case of smallpox has been reported in Imbler. Blanchard and family were placed under quarantine Wednesday.

The cause was thought to be a fire drill, but it soon was discovered that there was a fire—not in the school building, however, but a couple of blocks away a tool shop and wood house belonging to William Henric, the janitor of the school, was on fire. Pupils and teachers alike rushed to the scene and the bucket brigade was soon in full operation. The scots and many others did excellent service. The supply of water from the neighbors' wells was soon exhausted, and it began to look as if the fire would spread to other buildings close by, but fortunately a spray pump and a tank of water were close at hand, where Hans Westenskow has begun the erection of his new residence. These were quickly put to use and prevented the spread of the fire. Mr. Henric's insurance on the building had just expired four days previously. These, together with a number of tools owned by Mr. Westenskow, were also destroyed.

THE HOME GARDEN

TEN WEEKS' STOCKS
Attractive both for its fragrance and for its handsome flowers, in many soft shades, the ten weeks' stock is a favorite bedding plant.

However, it has developed a trick which has caused many gardeners to discard it. During the last few years some of the strains sold developed a habit of forming great tufts of leaves and failing to show a flower during the season, or until very late. These plants, one authority says, are the result of crossing with some of the biennial forms of stock, which have spoiled the purity of the annual strain, and they are being weeded out as fast as they can be found. This may or may not be the case, but several growers say they have solved this trouble by cutting the tap root when they transplant the seedling plants and that, by checking the rather thick central root and developing a more fibrous root system, the habit of running to leaves is conquered. However, even if a few plants show this weakness, the majority of a planting is not at all likely to do so, and the double spikes which

give a continuous display above gray-green foliage, make it a favorite wherever it is grown. The purple and lavender shades with the soft pinks and yellows are particularly attractive.

These plants are very easily raised annually from seed. One essential is to secure a first-class strain of seed from a reliable seed house. These seeds are selected from pre-flowering types and least likely to give the leafy non-blooming plants. The dwarf ten weeks' stocks are less likely to develop the leaf plants than the "cut-and-come-again" type. The latter have more biennial blood in them. The stocks like an open situation, where they will have plenty of sun, and like fairly rich soil, but will flourish in soil having less food supply than some other annuals. The dwarf ten weeks' stocks planted for beds of single color can furnish a very beautiful all-summer garden in themselves. Their spicy fragrance is most noticeable at nightfall and they are fine for cutting.

To keep flies from breeding in

the manure heap sprinkle it with powdered borax, about a pint to eight bushels of manure, and then wet it down.
