County Wide Gathering Tomorrow Night Is to Be Held; La Grande to Send Delegates.

A county-wide Old Oregon Trail Pageant booster meeting will be held in Enterprise tomorrow evening, to begin with a banquet at 7 o'clock. The purpose of the meeting is for endorsing Wallawa county under the trail colors and arranging for cooperation in the staging of the pageant, which commemorates the 50th anniversary of the crossing of the first wagon train over the Blue mountains, and celebrates the completion of the trail over the Blue mountains.

Several addresses will be made during the evening, chief among them being Walter E. Meacham's Old Oregon Trail address.

Representatives will be present from both Union and Baker counties also. Union, Baker, La Grande and other communities will send delegations, by auto, to the Wallawa county seat. About ten are expected to go to Enterprise from La Grande.
