CHANEY, MASTER MAKE-UP ARTIST, IS CALLED "MAN OF 1,000 FACES"

Unusual Characterizations Have Stamped Him the Leader—A Stickler for Detail in Every Role He Attempts.

There is one screen actor at least at whom the public cannot hurl the accusation, "Oh, he's always the same." He is Lon Chaney.

In fact, Chaney is never the same. You may see him today in one characterization and tomorrow when he comes to town in something else you will wonder who he is. Chaney has developed the art of make-up more than any other person in pictures. He fills the rarest and most difficult types with a perfection born of his own discoveries before his dressing table. "The Frog" in "The Miracle Man" was a portrayal almost terrifying in its reality. Next he was the king of the underworld in the "Gouverneur Morris" story, "The Penalty," a sneaky Chink in Marshall Neilan's "Bits of Life." His recent work has been equally as varied in its demands. He has been cast for the title role in "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" and for Fagin in "Oliver Twist."

But the most unusual and difficult part he has yet assayed is that of Yen Sin in "Shadows." Its obstacles lie in the subtle interpretation which it demands to show the Chinese nature in a way it has never before been painted. Yet Yen Sin is not the degraded type of Oriental so common in screen drama but a wise, inscrutable old Chinaman who pits his ancient philosophy against the teachings of the Puritanical town-folk of a New England fishing village.

The make-up for the part was so intricate that it required two hours and a half to don it. All the aids used from Chaney's paint box to create the Yen Sin face were his own inventions and the famous character actor says that the role is the most satisfactory one he has ever undertaken.

Chaney has reached the point in his career where his services are in continual demand by recognized producers in Hollywood. Unlike many others in the profession, he never experiences a period of enforced idleness between pictures. His engagements are usually more than he can make time for. Producers find themselves planning pictures in which Chaney is to appear with more than ordinary care so that they can employ him for the number of days that they actually need him. His yearly earnings reach a surprising figure.

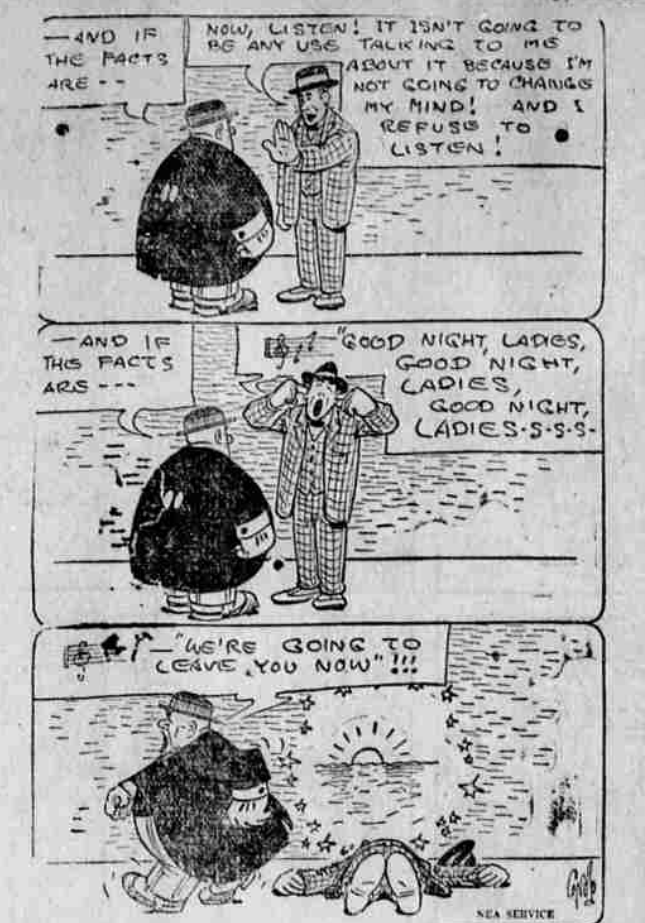

LEPER PRIEST'S NIECE SERVES

(By Associated Press). HONOLULU, T. H., May 5.—Sister Damien Joseph, grand-niece of Father Damien, the famous "martyr priest of Molokai," who served as confessor, teacher and guide to the inhabitants of the leper colony at Kalaupapa, Molokai, half a century ago, until he contracted the disease and died, has arrived here to teach at the Sacred Heart academy. Sister Damien has been teaching in a Catholic academy at Fairhaven, Mass., since her arrival in the United States from France. Father Damien was a brother of Sister Damien's grandfather, and was born near Louvain, Belgium. He was educated at the University of Louvain and joined the Order of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary in 1862. In 1873, at his own request, he was sent to Molokai to work among the lepers. Eleven years later he contracted the disease, and died in 1889.

COP IS KNOWN BY THE FEET HE KEEPS

Kohn told a police court judge that he was sure World was a policeman as soon as he got a good look at his footgear.
