WILL SHOW A HEALTH FILM

"One Scar or Many" is a film which deals with the problem of smallpox. It tells the story of vaccination. Shows what vaccine is and how obtained. Animated diagrams show the preventive effect of vaccination and also the alarming increase of smallpox cases in the United States since 1915.

This film was prepared under the personal supervision of Dr. Milton J. Rosenau, Professor of Preventive Medicine, Harvard University, and will be shown at the Arcade Theater May 7th and 8th.

Those who are opposed to the use of this vaccine should see the film for it may be that they are not thoroughly acquainted with the benefit derived from its use and the great harm done by the lack of use. At any rate whether for or against it, see the film and get informed. So often we say we are not for something because we do not really know its true value.

Wallowa Standard Oil Station Is Now Opened

WALLOWA, May 5.—The Standard Oil substation opened for business Tuesday with Sergius Gaulke in charge. All that remains to be done is to put on the gray paint, which will conceal the corrugated iron and the vermilion colored tanks. A switch is being built from the railroad Y to accommodate the cars. The tanks are now half full of gasoline and kerosene, and two more cars are expected this week to fill the two 20,000 gallon containers. These tanks are 10 1/2 by 36 feet in diameter and stand on end. They are filled by pumps driven by a gas engine, which forces the oil from the tank cars into the tanks.

The price of gas is now seven cents cheaper than a year ago. Both companies have eliminated differential from Enterprise, which amounted to two cents, or \$2000 a year to gas users of the city.

P. C. Calvert, the engineer in charge, left Thursday for La Grande, his work being finished.

Work was started this week by Cyrus Johnson in getting the land into shape on the forty-acre tract on the C. A. Hunter ranch. A new improved type of leveler is being built, and Mr. Johnson is eager to get on the work.
