C. G. Holst Is Dead
 The remains of C. G. Holst arrived at Joseph on Saturday train. Accompanying the body from Portland were Mrs. Holst and Mr. and Mrs. Earl Smith. Awaiting the arrival of Mr. Holst's brother and sister from Chicago, the funeral was not held until Tuesday.

Christian George Holst was born in Norway March 30, 1854, and died at Longview, Wash., April 24, 1923. Mr. Holst came to America at the age of twenty-one, learning the trade of brick mason and following that for many years at Chicago and other larger centers. He came to Oregon 19 years ago and came to Joseph in 1907. Being of an industrious nature he was always busy at his trade and in Joseph and other towns of the valley stand numerous buildings erected by him. One of his first jobs in Joseph was erecting the Collinsworth building.

In 1909 Mr. Holst was united in marriage with Mrs. Edith Jennings. Mrs. Holst had been a member of the Oddfellows for twenty years. He was a big, good natured man, friendly to all, and his untimely demise is deeply regretted by those who knew him.

The deceased is survived by his wife, his brother and sister, who reside in Chicago, a brother, Martin Johnson, and an aged father in Norway. —Joseph Herald

 Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Commission of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, proposes and intends to improve District No. 123 in the City of La Grande, Oregon, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor heretofore adopted by the Commission, and that the report of the committee on estimates for said improvement is now on file in the office of the Recorder of the City of La Grande, Oregon; that the said Commission has set Wednesday, the 16th day of May, 1923, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., of said day at the Commission Room in the City building in La Grande, Oregon, as the time and place when and where said Commission will meet and hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievance of any persons against said proposed improvement and the proposed assessment therefor against the property to be benefited thereby in said district.
