OFFICIALS PROBE DEEPENS COLLEGE DEATH MYSTERY

CHICAGO, May 7.—The mystery surrounding the death of Leighton Mount, Northwestern University student, whose skeleton was found beneath a pier near Lake Evanston, Monday, was deepened Friday by the questioning in the state's attorneys of more than 100 undergraduates.

After insisting for days that Mount, who disappeared in September, 1921, after taking part in a class rush, had met his death as a result of hazing and that his body had been hidden by fellow students, officials Friday night said that the theory that he committed suicide does not seem so improbable as it did at first.

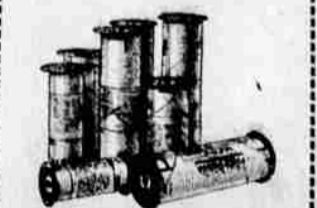
