"But," said Editor Riches, "people thought the matter over for a while and then they decided they would go to work—not in a sort of a proxy manner—but actually work to get out of it. The result is marvelous. Malheur is coming out of the kinks very rapidly. The livestock is improving and the alfalfa country is doing good. By the way, did you ever stop to think that the only thing wrong with America today is the lack of work. That is the salvation for all communities. There is no short cut to prosperity, there is no legislation that will effect a cure. What every community needs is just what Malheur people decided to do—go to work."

CHINESE BANDITS SEIZE TRAIN

(Continued from page 1) tacked by the bandits, who disarmed soldiers estimated at 1000 strong and tore up a long stretch of the track. Fifty first class and 10 second class passengers were carried off. It was reported here. Six foreigners escaped.

27 Foreigners Captured. SHANGHAI, May 7.—Bandits who held up the northbound express train of the Tientsin-Pukow early Sunday morning, captured the entire party of foreigners who left here on the train Saturday, according to private messages received here Monday from Lin-hsing and Tsung, Shantung. The messenger said the bandits removed the fish plates from the tracks derailing the train just north of the Shantung border. A Shanghai-Nanking railway message said the train was attacked by a band of 1000 bandits who carried off 27 foreigners and more than 100 Chinese who were passengers. The messages confirmed the capture of Fred Bliss, Edward Bliss, Theodore Saphire, Emil Genesburger, J. H. Powell and Lloyd Lehrs, all of whom were among the 27 foreigners who left here Saturday. Others reported captured were: Leon Friedman, Lee C. Solomon, G. D. Musso, a prominent Italian attorney, and his secretary, Miss Alba Corvati. An unconfirmed report said that one British subject named Botman was killed.

U. O. SENIOR CLASS LARGE (By Associated Press) EUGENE, Ore., May 7.—Approximately 350 seniors will be graduated from the University of Oregon June 25, a marked increase over the number in former graduating classes, according to Carlton Spencer, registrar. The 1922 graduating class numbered 296. Eight years ago, in 1915, the graduating class numbered only 107.
