Baker Fishing Pool
 Fishermen of Baker who Sunday journeyed to their favorite streams in search of the Rainbow, Cutthroat

or Eastern Brook trout were generally disappointed as they found the streams badly swollen and riled caused by the warm weather of the preceding days. But few catches of any size were reported and the sport will now probably be at a standstill until the first rush of water has past. Reports from Pine Valley state that for the past two weeks the trout have been biting fine and several salmon have been taken. In Eagle Valley, Daly creek, near Richland, has provided a mecca and some of the largest fish in years have been taken from that small stream.—Baker Democrat.

The town has a population of 300 persons and is a station on the O.W. R. & N. railroad.—Oregonian.

Increases His Tackle
 L. C. "Tex" Ardeburn has increased the size of his fishing tackle recently, all because of some information Mrs. Ardeburn received from a sister, Mrs. S. E. Rape, of Florida. Recently a big fish 45 feet long that weighed 15 tons was caught south of Miami, and the monster was displayed as a curiosity. Literature showing pictures of the fish and describing it were sent to Mrs. Ardeburn. Scientists, according to the literature, declare that the super whale is a whole only in size and is different from any fish about which science has any information. Its hide was three inches thick and shots from high powered rifles had no other effect on the monster while it was being conquered than to enrage it. Scientists have expressed the opinion that the fish formerly lived in very deep water and may have been forced to the top by some sort of volcanic action. Its eyes are useless. Because he thinks he might get hold of some similar fish to this one, or the one that pulled Los Gibbs into McKay creek last year, "Tex" has strengthened all his tackle.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

Fast Trip By Auto
 Osborn Keown, formerly of Baker but in business in Los Angeles, is in Baker on a short visit. Mr. Keown reports conditions very good in California and will make that state his home although he states he still has a big place in his heart for Baker. The trip from Los Angeles was made by auto and exceptional time was made en route. He left Los Angeles Wednesday morning, May 2nd, and arrived in Baker Saturday evening, May 5th, making the 1500 mile journey at a rate of nearly 400 miles per day. Wednesday, the first day, 412 miles were covered when he drove from Los Angeles to Sacramento, Thursday he drove from Sacramento to Yreka, California, Friday from Yreka to Portland and Saturday from Portland to Baker. On

Friday he met the Shasta Limited at Ashland and drove side by side with it to Eugene, a distance of 203 miles and beat it to the latter place by twenty minutes. This is the fastest train between San Francisco and Portland. Mr. Keown took pictures of the train at times as it passed him. The Portland to Baker trip was made in 12 1/2 hours and in that time twelve pictures were taken of the Columbia River highway section of the Old Oregon Trail. But two punctures were had during the journey and Mr. Keown was stuck in the mud on the Blue mountains twice. He states that he believes that the time made from Portland will be lowered as the conditions of the roads improve. Mrs. William Kimbrough, his mother, who has been visiting in California, returned with him.—Baker Democrat.
