**COLOR SCENES MAKE "ADAM'S
RIB" A NOVEL PHOTOPLAY**

New Photographic Process Employed
by Cecil B. De Mille in Big
Production.

Color photography carried to the
most logical degree yet reached is a
special feature of "Adam's Rib,"
Cecil B. De Mille's new Paramount
picture featuring Milton Sills, Elliott
Dexter, Theodore Kosloff, Anna
Nixon, Pauline Garon and Julia
Paye which will be presented at the
Arcade theater, starting Thursday.

"All over" color photography carried
to the tints of the skin is ad-
mittedly still to come in its final per-
fection. Color "spotted" through the
regular blacks, grays and whites of
the celluloid is a point, however, to
which real perfection is said to have
now been reached through a color
registering system perfected by Para-
mount and used for the first time in
"Adam's Rib."

The scene in which the spotted
color appears is a night bathroom
scene showing a large group of dan-
cers. The pairs of dancers are fur-
nished with Japanese lanterns. The
main lights of the room are turned
out and the lanterns lighted. Each
lantern has been "spotted" a differ-
ent color, red, blue, yellow, purple,
a myriad of tints. And the color is
perfected on the faces of the in-
dividuals carrying the lanterns. These
