

SUM IS VOTED FOR BUILDING SCHOOLHOUSE

Wolf Creek Voters Consent to Bonding of District for \$10,000 to Erect School House.

NORTH POWDER, May 10.—The voters of Wolf Creek district had a special election on Wednesday to vote for the bonding of the district to the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of building a new brick school house.

The building will be two rooms with a full size basement and will be a big improvement of the present building. The bonds are sold and will be placed at once as the board will deliver them to a Portland firm who has bought them.

The new school building will be as modern as any of the late buildings and every effort will be put forth to give the children as good advantages as can be had anywhere. The old building was not large enough to accommodate the children and for the past few years the Grange hall had been used for school purposes. This was too cold and the only way out of the dilemma was to build a new school house and the school directors were supported in this view by most of the members of the district. The new building will be ready for the fall term of school.

Heavy Grain Shipments.
Local grain houses have shipped 22,000 bushels of grain. The past two weeks the local warehouse men have been very busy shipping out their surplus grain. The Intermountain company have shipped 12,000 bushels in the past two weeks and the North Powder M. & M. company have shipped 9,000 bushels in the same time.

The M. & M. company has a mill that is busy all the time grinding wheat for which they have a ready sale. They are busy from 12 to 14 hours every day with orders ahead.

W. A. Hudson has planted some acres of his place to alfalfa for seed as a trout and if the experiment is a success the seed will be offered to the farmers. It is claimed that it will yield as high as 100 bushels per acre and raise with barley and oats as a feed for stock. Mr. Hudson is going to try it out and the farmers will go the benefit of his experience.

Wins Damage Suit.

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terranean, the silveta varieties from the European shores and the yellow from the Algerian coast.

They form rosettes of leaves upon the ground, and from the center of these rosettes the flower stems with their clouds of small blossoms arise. They like a rather light soil and plenty of hot sun. While they are biennial in their native state, they are grown as annuals, and from seed started early will bloom in late summer. If an unusual and very ornamental plant is desired which will do double duty both for garden dis-

play and for winter houseplants, these new statice are well worth trying.

The seed should be started at once in order to give them as long a growing season as possible.

The Russian statice, *Statice rupestris*, is an old-time garden annual which has been neglected for many years but is again coming back, and strangely enough as a greenhouse plant, although it is an easily grown garden annual. It differs from the *statice* type in having long, branching spikes closely set with tiny rose

pink flowers. The leaves lie flat upon the ground, somewhat resembling a plantain seed spike until the flowers expand and the branches develop. It is a very unusual appearing plant and very decorative for cutting, especially when arranged with the loosely branched lavender varieties.

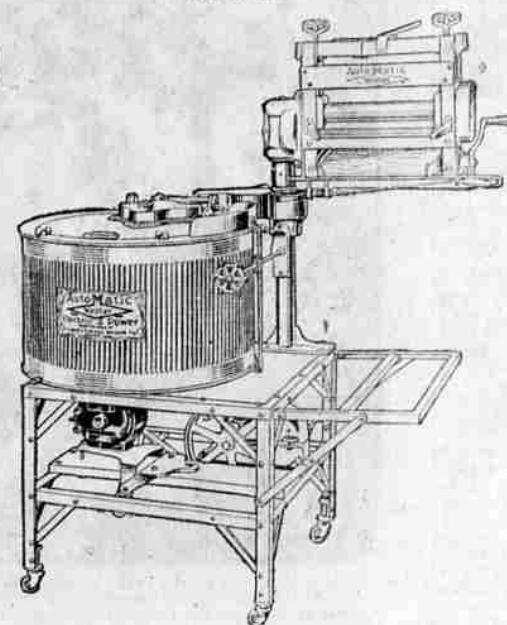

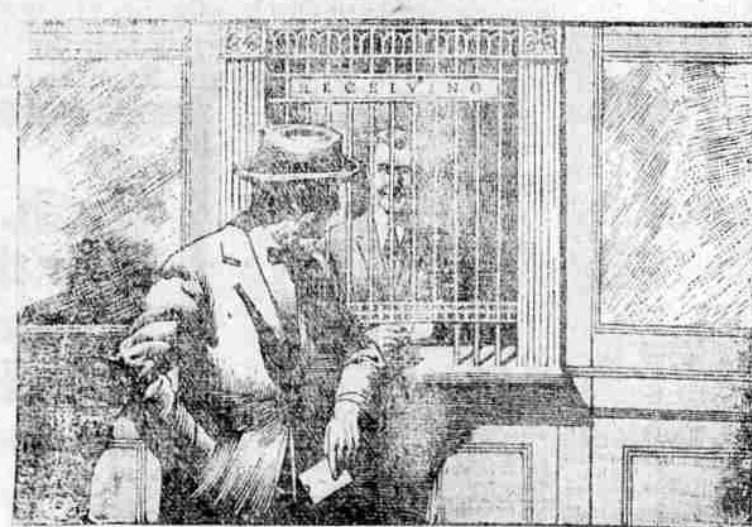
