ans To See Pirates Play Here Sunday

Opening Game at Home Will Be Against the Union Aggregation; Fast Game Is Anticipated.

La Grande will have their first chance to see their baseball team, the Pirates, in action Sunday afternoon at the fairgrounds. Union, who at present occupy the cellar jointly with the Pirates, will be their opponents in the national game, and La Grande given a slight edge over the Union aggregation for the winning score. A large crowd is anticipated Sunday. Union, like La Grande, was not their strongest when they played last week in the opening game, and both teams are being bolstered this week. A new ace or two will appear in the Pirate crew and the locals expect to juggle their line-up somewhat.

Manager Crews has not yet announced his line-up for the Union-La Grande game and will probably not do so until just before the game. The night will find a place on the list somewhere and possibly some other changes will be made, although that is doubtful.

20 to \$50 Is Price of Dempsey-Gibbons Fight

SHELBY, Mont., May 11.—Ring-side seats for the heavy-weight championship fight here July 4 between Jack Dempsey and Tommy Gibbons at cost \$50 plus war tax, the promoters announced Thursday, ranging downward, the prices will be \$20, \$25 and \$20, exclusive of war tax. Newton, of Pendleton, stands a good chance to beat the discus mark and LaDue, of Pendleton, looks good as a possible high jumper who will exceed past performances. The relay mark might be broken. Several other marks might be shattered but the above mentioned are the most likely.

The mile and half mile races should prove the two most thrilling events of the day. Bates, of Union, a new man but one of prowess, is expected to beat Hunter, of Pendleton, in the mile, and Earnhart, of Pendleton, in the half mile. Whether he can or not remains to be seen, but either way it is bound to be close.


Either La Grande or Pendleton will win the meet—the most timid have no hesitancy in saying that. Both schools have an assortment of men that make a well balanced team, capable of taking points in practically every event, and the rivalry will be intense between them. Pendleton has won the last five out of six Eastern Oregon meets, La Grande winning the other, and both schools are expecting to exert their utmost Saturday.

BAKER, May 11.—Members of the Hi-Y club of the Baker high school headed by Harold Trebbe, president of the organization, will police the field at the eastern Oregon meet Saturday, according to an announcement from the high school yesterday.
