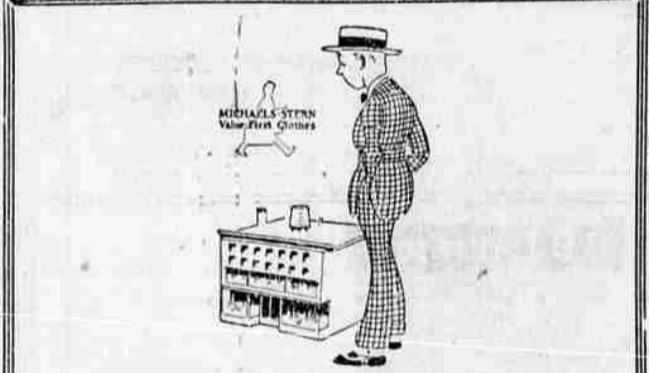

FATE OF MISSING AIRMEN IS SOLVED

(By Associated Press.) SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 14.—Remains of two men found on Cuyamaca mountain in this country near the engine and fragments of an aeroplane were positively identified as dawn Sunday as those of Col. Francis H. Marshall and Lieut. Charles Webber, whose fate has been a mystery since they left on a flight to Tucson, Arizona. Guided by G. W. McCain, cat-tleman, who found the bones and wreckage Saturday, two reporters reached the spot after a night lost on the mountain in a dense fog and discovered a military cap in which Lieutenant Webber's name was still legible. The skulls of both officers were crushed and other bones broken, indicating that both died instantly after the fatal crash into the mountain wilderness at an altitude of nearly 8000 feet. As a heavy fog lay on the mountains at that time, it is supposed the fliers had lost their way and crashed against the mountain before they had time to realize their danger.

(Continued from Page One.) the runners to perform at their best. Fast Times Made With Wind. With a strong, brisk wind at their back, the century men breezed in the finals with some real speed. Stonebreaker, of Pendleton, placed first in 10 1-5 seconds, according to the timer's watch. In the 220 yard dash, again with a strong wind at their backs urging them on, Taggart of Baker, blew in ahead of Whiteman, of Pendleton, for first, making it in 23 1-5 seconds. The 440 yard dash went to Earnhardt in 53 4-5 seconds. Beaten By One Inch. Jacobson, of La Grande, was beaten for first place in the broad jump by MaGee, of Pendleton, with but one inch margin. Whiteman went 18 feet, and "Jakie" went but 17 1/2. Again, in the shotput, Larson who put the shot well over 40 feet, was beaten out by a diphkhorre, named Boston, from Vale, Oregon, who took first with a heave of 42 feet 4 inches. Several surprises were shown by the smaller schools. Magg, of Milton-Freewater, beat Smith, of La Grande, for first place in the pole vault. Goodwin, of Muddy Creek, placed second in the discus. Edwards, of Milton-Freewater, was chalked up winner in the javelin. Ties Record. One other Eastern Oregon record was tied Saturday afternoon. In the 100 yard dash, won by the high jump at 5 feet 6 inches, and endeavored to break the record but failed. La Grande was strong in the dashes and hurdles. Compared with Pendleton, La Grande took a total of 22 points to the Bucks' 17 out of the 100, 220 and 440 yard dash and the high and low hurdles.
