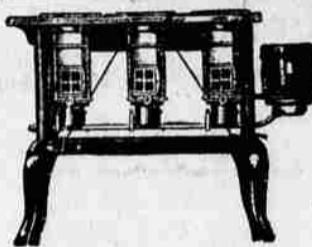

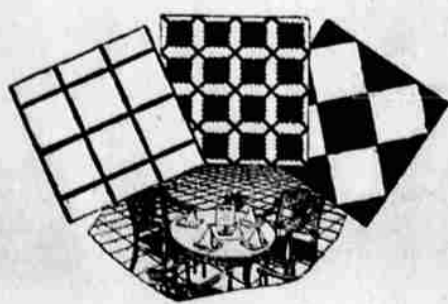

**EGG OUTPUT ENORMOUS.**  
CENTRALIA, Wash., May 15.—The Washington Co-operative Egg and Poultry association in 1922 handled 266,284 cases of eggs, or 545 cartons for poultrymen of the state, for which the latter received \$2,174,180.77. W. A. Linklater, superintendent of the poultry department of the western experiment station of Washington at Pullman, declared Thursday night when he addressed Forida prairie poultrymen. Half of the cases handled were shipped to New York City, Mr. Linklater said.

J. C. Lawrence, manager of the Wintock branch of the Washington association announced that Wintock poultrymen would hold a "homecoming" celebration June 30. One hundred cases of eggs per week are being received at Wintock from Ford's prairie poultrymen, Mr. Lawrence said.
