POWDER BOY IS SEVERELY HURT

NORTH POWDER, May 15.—William, the little six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Hutchinson was killed by a young calf, in the stomach, and it looked for a few days as if it might result fatally to the child. He and a cousin, who were playing with the calf and William was twisting its tale, trying to make it go, while the other boy was riding it, when the animal kicked him in the stomach, knocking him down and hurting him badly. Medical help was summoned and for a few days he was in a dazed condition, and it was thought that an operation might have to be had to relieve the condition, but an X-ray picture did not show any necessity for it, and the latest report is that he is getting better.

The little five-year-old daughter of George Hicock had a very narrow escape from serious injury. The little girl was playing around the room when a refrigerator toppled over on her. Her mother rushed to her aid when she heard her scream, but the child had managed to get out from under it. She was badly bruised and frightened.
