

ANGORA MAY BECOME TURK

ANGORA, May 17. — If Admiral Colby M. Chester and his American associates undertake to convert Angora into a modern capital on the lines of Washington, they probably will find sufficient work to occupy them for many years.

If Angora is rebuilt it may mean the abandonment of Constantinople as the capital of Turkey. Many Turks favor the retention of Angora as the seat of government because of its military and naval invulnerability.

It is 215 miles southeast of Constantinople, free from attack by hostile armies or navies entering the Dardanelles. The Greek army essayed to reach Angora in 1921 with disastrous results.

The most inspiring building in Angora, among an array of structures that would scarcely do credit to the most backward of American mining villages, is the extravagantly-named Grand National Assembly. It is a dilapidated two-story affair that was once a club.

Mustapha Kemal has given Angora much of its importance. He lived here many years and was the leading spirit in the foundation of the Nationalist movement which has reunited the Turks. He realizes that to keep up with the west, much of western civilization must be adopted.

"Education, to be for the good of the nation," says the Nationalist leader, "must be based upon the systems of the west. Above all, both men and women have got to be perfectly free. I do not want to thicken the veil of the women, nor have I any sympathy with the prevalent practice of Moslem women living in isolation."
