## LARGE CROWD HEARS SERMON

The following extracts of an address by Evangelist Gilstrap last evening proved very interesting. A large crowd was in attendance last evening at the revival meeting. He announced that his subject for this evening would be "How God Reveals Himself."

"The Resurrection of Christ from the grave is the central proposition among them is the unnatural fool."

of the gospel and the fundamental fact of Christian faith.

"The great majority of unconverted people demand the proof of secular or profane history to the resurrection; To me that is the most vulgar and the least important proof that could be presented however it does have its bearing, so we will use that principle first of all tonight. Here Gilstrap read from a number of secular historians, of the time of the resurrection, their statements concerning the Resurrection.

"Something transformed the apostles. Was it a lie? Friends, a lie never transformed any one into a better man, it has always changed bad men into worse men. Yet these men who had a chance to know and did know what became of the body of Christ claimed that he was raised. When there was no possibility of anything to gain and there was everything to lose by so doing they advanced this proposition thru terrible opposition and then died for it. Do men die for what they know to be lies? No. Not men who are sane enough to do the wonderful things the apostles did."

"Some say they cannot believe in the supernatural and the impossible. To me there is nothing impossible unless it is putting brains in the heads of some of these 'impossible' idiots who know absolutely everything in this universe that may be known."

"The commonest thing with which you deal is as big a miracle as the most wonderful. The only reason that anything is a miracle is because it has not been done before. If the sun had never risen it would be a miracle to see it come up in the morning. Who are you, you poor miserable little shrimp that you should dilly to fix the limits of the natural and supernatural as long as the infinite God still lives. There are some things which are unnatural, the grave is the central proposition among them is the unnatural fool."

## CAMERA MAN WILL "SHOOT" COLUMBIA BASIN SCENES NOW

(By Associated Press)  
 SPOKANE, Wash., May 17.—Two thousand feet of film will be "shot" in the Columbia Basin project and scenic features incidental to the region, following the decision of the irrigation league recently to use this method to bring the project before the people of the United States.

A cameraman is on his way from Washington with a member of the reclamation bureau staff to take the pictures. The league is paying all expenses and will receive a copy of the film and a special rate on additional copies that may be desired.

The federal bureau will add the film to its circulating library which is being continually drawn upon by clubs and societies in all parts of the country.

It is also hoped to interest some of the news weeklies in showing portions of the film in their budgets at picture houses. The scenes will show federal officers and league directors on the project.
