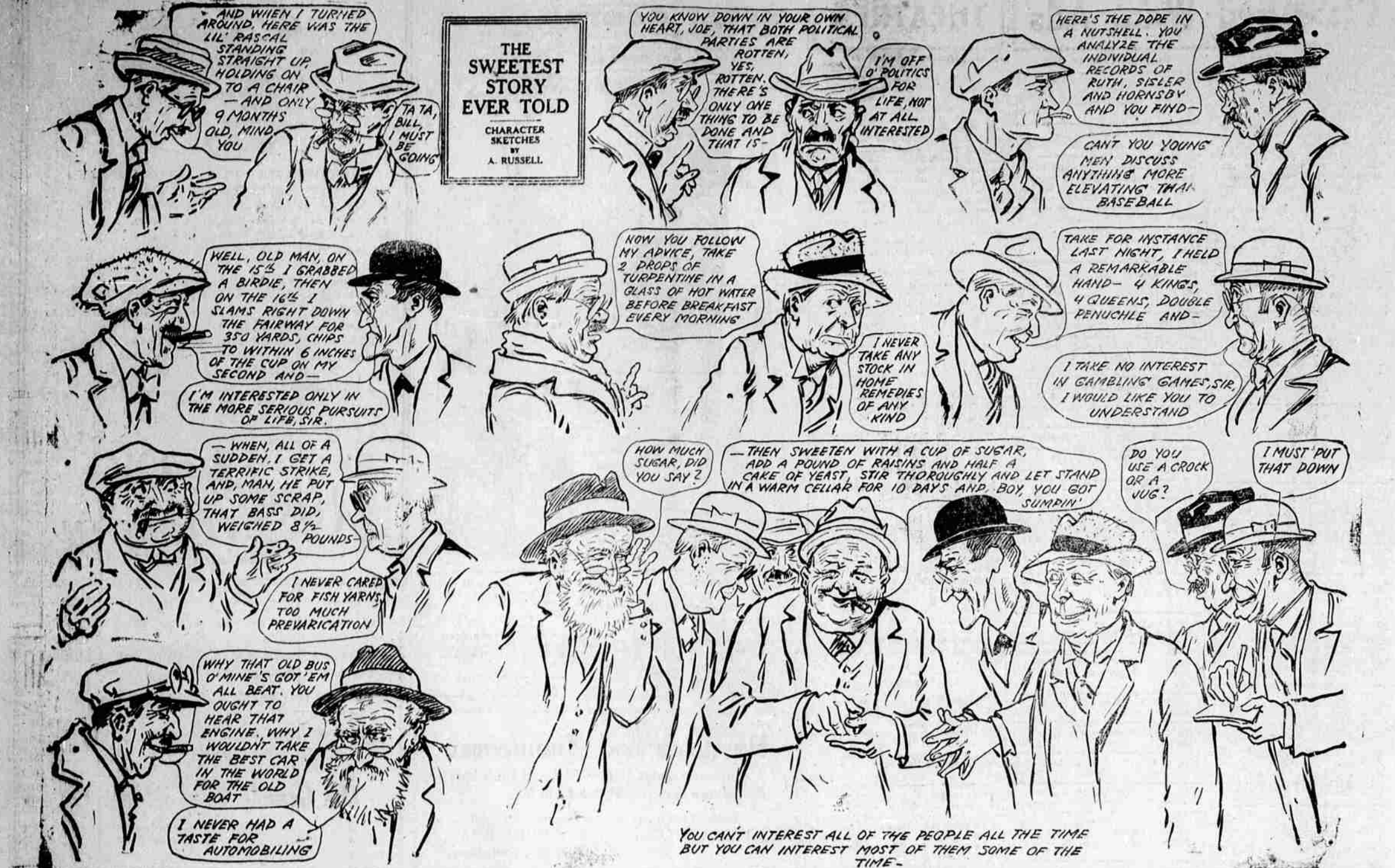




TRAINING CAMPS WILL BE HELD

Citizens' Military Training Camps at Fort Worden and Camp Lewis Are Announced.

The citizens' military training camp for Oregon, and Washington, conducted by the war department under the national defense act, will be held again this year at Camp Lewis, Washington, from July 24th to August 24th. Eight hundred young men will be received at Camp Lewis for instruction in infantry, field artillery, cavalry, engineers and signal corps branches; and 50 will be sent to Fort Worden for coast artillery instruction. There will be no course in aviation.

The objects of these camps, three being held yearly for each of the nine corps areas in the United States, are to bring together young Americans of high type from all sections of the country, thereby developing closer national and social unity; to teach the privileges, duties and responsibilities of American citizenship; to stimulate patriotism; to interest young men in the importance of military training; to teach self discipline; to learn the importance of proper physical and mental hygiene and to develop the physical standard of the American youth through participation in military exercises, athletic games and sports, conducted under expert direction.

The benefits derived by attending the camp are secured without expense to the students, as the war department provides transportation to camp and return, board, lodging and expert medical attention, uniforms, equipment, arms, laundry (for everything issued at camp), and amusements in the form of athletics, games and musical entertainments. Last year nearly 600 enthusiastic young Americans "weighed in" at Camp Lewis for the citizens' military training camp, and were found on "weighing out" to have made an average gain of 2.57 pounds per man, a good general indication of the benefits of their training during a four weeks' period.

Four courses of instruction will be given: a basic Red course—age limits from 17 to 24 years; an advanced Red course—17 to 24 years; a White course—18 to 24, and a Blue course—19 to 24 years. Applicants for the basic Red course need have had no previous course at a citizens' military training camp and no previous military training of any kind. They must possess average general intelligence, be able to read and write English and be of good moral character. This course covers the simple fundamentals of military training and sanitation and hygiene and qualifies the student to take the next higher or advanced Red course. The advanced Red course qualifies for the next higher or White course, and includes advanced instruction in military drill included in the basic Red course. For the White course, applicants must have a grammar school education or its equivalent. Selected enlisted men of the reg-

ular army, national guard and organized reserves and selected citizens who have completed a Red course in 1921 or 1922, and who were recommended for the next higher or White course, are eligible for enrollment in this summer's White course.

Educational requirements for the Blue course are those prescribed for appointment as second lieutenant in the officers' reserve corps, the minimum being a high school education or its equivalent. This course provides training with the object of qualifying selected warrant officers and enlisted men in the regular army, national guard and enlisted reserve corps, who have completed the White course or who have had military training recognized as equivalent thereto, for service as second lieutenants.

The age limits shown above do not apply to those who attended a citizens' military training camp in 1921 or 1922.

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SOCIAL WORKERS TO MEET ON MAY 22-25

Calif., May 18.—Twelve hundred social workers from every part of California are expected to attend the annual California Conference of Social Work here May 22-25, according to Miss Anna Eldridge, San Francisco, executive secretary. Prominent men and women interested in social welfare from various parts of the country are expected to attend and address the conference. In addition, official delegates from Oregon, Washington, Nevada and possibly other western states will be present. Dr. Stephen Mather, director of national parks,

will welcome the conference. Professor William Fielding Ogburn of Columbia University, New York City, will address the conference on "Progress and Social Maladjustment." Tablin Martin A. Meyer of Temple University, San Francisco, will speak on "Social Work Among the Itch." Among other speakers are James Brockway, president of the Oregon Association of Social Workers, whose topic will be "The Outlook in Oregon." Dr. E. C. Kohn, psychological lecturer on domestic relations, University of Oregon, "Juvenile Delinquency," and A. B. C. Dohrmann, San Francisco, treasurer of the California conference. Mr. Dohrmann will discuss the community chest method of charitable work.

Officers of the conference, in addition to Miss Eldridge and Mr. Dohrmann, are I. Irving Lipsitch, San Francisco, president; E. P. Van Allen, Fresno, first vice president; and Mrs. Elizabeth McManus, Los Angeles, Mrs. M. Williams, Bakersfield, V. D. Whitmore, Corvallis, and Rev. Harvey V. Miller, Alameda, vice presidents.

OLD FORT NEAR SPOKANE DOOMED

SPOKANE, Wash., May 18.—Old Fort Spokane, built near the confluence of the Spokane and Columbia rivers, has been doomed and will be torn down inside of a few months.
