WORLD FEARS GREGO-TURK CRISIS NOW

Ismet Pasha and Venizelos Admit Efforts to Settle Dispute Fail; Greco-Turkish Parley Futile.

PARIS, May 18.—The Havas correspondent at Lausanne telegraphs that Ismet Pasha and Mr. Venizelos, respective heads of the Turkish and Greek delegations to the Near East conference, admit that their efforts to settle directly between themselves the problem of reparations in Asia Minor have failed utterly.

The situation as between Turkey and Greece, the correspondent adds, is so serious that the success of the conference is doubtful.

WAGON TRAIN TO BE FEATURE OF TRAIL PAGEANT

BAKER, May 18.—In the coming pageant of the Old Oregon Trail celebration, Top O' Blue Mountain, the wagon train will be the central figure with the balance of the parade built around it. The success of the wagon train will depend upon what is done by Baker. Various organizations in the city have already taken action and promised their support. The Knights of Pythias lodge was the first to act, followed closely by the Knights of Columbus, Elks, and American Legion, and assurance has been received that other organizations will also assist.

The present plan is to trail the wagons from Baker to Top O' Blue Mountain, taking two and a half days for the trip, camping enroute. This will be a good advertisement for the pageant and show that Baker is doing her part.
