The other roles were delightfully played by Bert Woodruff, as the storekeeper; Raymond Cannon as the caddish Lon Kimball, and Henry Rattenbury as the comedy constable.

Did Robin Hood Live Still Under Dispute? Famous Character Portrayed in His New Photoplay Sensation.

There are plenty of undisputed historical facts concerning the events of the Twelfth Century in England. His companions were Friar Tuck, Little John, Will Scarlet, Allan-a-Dale and George-a-Green.

Due to the many conflicting traditions affiliated with this romantic name, the characterizations of such a personality by so great an exponent of romantic drama as Douglas Fairbanks compels attention and the impression his photodramatic production gives of the Spirit of Chivalry as typified by Robin Hood and those in his sphere constitutes a veritable zenith in engrossing diversion. The picturization "Douglas Fairbanks in Robin Hood" belongs in the same category as the great novel possessing an historical background. It is both of historical value and of traditional charm, a charm born of delectable fiction unfolded in a masterly style by a truly distinguished actor.

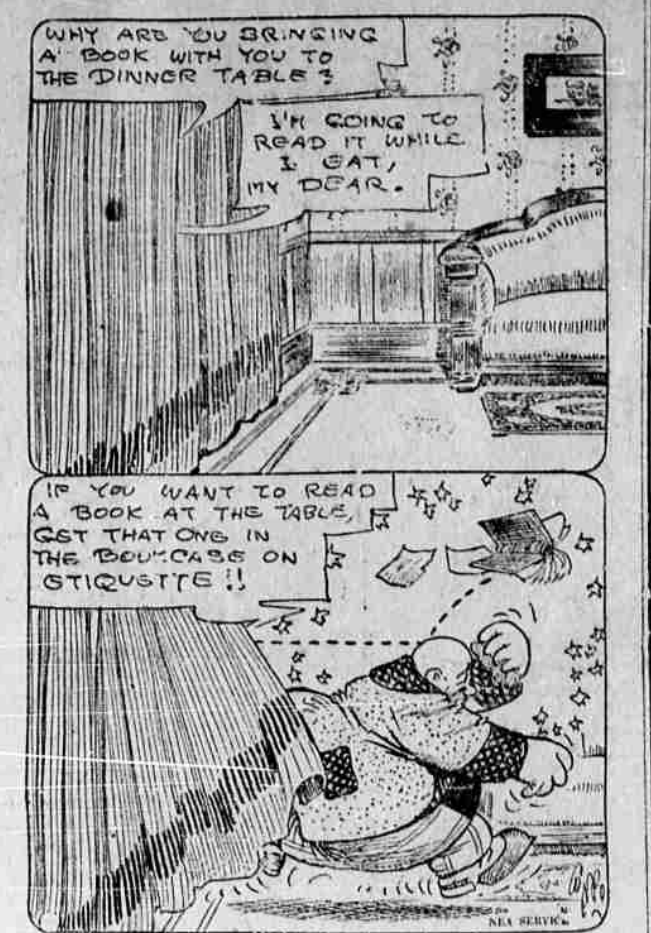
STAR BOOKS MOST FAMOUS OF ALL FILMS

With two cameramen in the party they sailed from the Pacific coast in 1919 and spent two and one-half years in the heart of darkest Africa. With the novel aid of the American flyover, more than 50,000 miles and ten different countries were covered.

The hunting of the ferocious man-killers was attended by many thrills. Characters and habits of lions, leopards, rhinoceroses, elephants, etc., are graphically illustrated by the pictorial details of the hunt. The capture of the three little lion cubs, and the scene showing how the mother baboon "perambulates" her baby, especially delight the young folks.

At the waterhole the untamed natural history collection is like Noah's Ark.

Interwoven with the animal pictures is a series describing native homes in a ceremonial. These tell more of the African origin of Occidental dances and fashions than many learned tomes.
