Championship fights, especially those of the heavyweight class, such as the Gibbons-Dempsey scrap scheduled for July 4th at Shelby, Montana, are very rarely held in this section of the country. And with the fight now assured, East Oregonians by the score are announcing their intentions of attending. Shelby isn't so very far from La Grande, Pendleton, Baker and the other towns and cities in this district, and the fans who plan to see the champion in action defending his belt, are many. They are mostly planning on driving to Shelby, via motor, although a good share will ride the cushions.

"I think that it is going to be a first class fight," one fan, who states that he is going to Shelby, said yesterday, "and any time that a real, honest-to-goodness scrap is put on in traveling distance, I'm headed for a ring-side."

ZBYNSKO LOSES HANDICAP. TULSA, May 19.—Stanislaw Zbynsko, former heavyweight, wrestling champion, lost a handicap match to Joe "Toots" Mondit of Colorado here Thursday night after 75 minutes of wrestling. Zbynsko had agreed to throw Mondit twice in 75 minutes. No fall was obtained. Mondit was the aggressor throughout.

NEW YORK BARS WILLARD. NEW YORK, May 19.—The New York state athletic commission has forbidden the proposed boxing match between Jess Willard and Luis Angel Firpo, it was learned Friday night, on the ground that Willard's age is beyond the legal limit. Tex Richard, promoter of the bout, is said to be making plans to stage it in New Jersey, probably at Boyle's Thirty Acres.

NEW RATE PLAN NOW EXPLAINED

What is meant by "flat rates service?" Much discussion of this subject is heard among motor car owners, but it is evident, from the nature of these conversations, that many have only a vague idea of its real significance. As a matter of fact, flat rates service, as applied by the leading automobile dealers, is not definable in a single sentence.

"In the first place," according to L. C. Smith, local dealer for Dodge Brothers, "it means that a careful study was made of the thousands of operations that might enter into the repairing of a motor car. On the basis of these time-studies, reasonable time allowances for every conceivable service job were established, and the mechanic is required to complete each job within the allotted time."

"When an owner brings his car to the service station for repairs," says Mr. Smith, "we are able to quote him a positive figure for the work to be done. We are also enabled to give him a definite delivery promise, with the knowledge that the car will come out of the shop on time. Thus, the owner has no possible ground for complaint, either as to price or delivery. In short, flat rates service means that the service station is able to tell the owner exactly how long it will take to repair his car and the price of such repairs. It permits the selling of service on a business-like basis."

"But there is an element of even greater importance to the car owner. The mechanic is paid by the job and contrives to get it finished on time, that he may start a new job. Naturally he is anxious to make as much money as possible, and such a plan eliminates loafing. A feature of this system is the penalty that requires each mechanic to make good without additional pay, any of his work that is returned because of inferior workmanship. This precludes any possibility of carelessness on the part of the mechanic."

"We have found positively," concludes Mr. Smith, "that this method not only reduces the charges to car owners, but it improves the quality of our service work. It is the nearest thing to perfection that I have ever seen in the line of service efficiency."

STORM INJURES TWO. HOUSTON, Tex., May 19.—Two persons were injured in a severe storm at Oualline Mills, near Conroe, 40 miles north of here, early Friday, according to reports. The home of S. Mador, farmer, was destroyed, and Mrs. Mador and L. M. Whidden, a boarder, were injured.

AGGIES BEAT OREGON ON TRACK AND FIELD

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 19.—The Oregon Aggies, showing marked strength in the distance and field events, took the dual track and field meet from the Oregon squad today by a 72 to 53 score. Oregon led throughout the early part of the meet but the Aggies came from behind with first and second in the two-mile and a tie for first and a third in the high jump and romped away with the meet by a 13 point lead. The relay was not run off as Oregon could not win with that event.

Ralph Spearow cracked the conference record in the pole vault, topping the bar at 13 feet 1.2 inch, and tried four times to go over the bar at 13 feet 4 inches in an attempt to break the world's record of 13 feet 5.5-8 inches. Twice he all but made it, only to brush the bar with an elbow or heel. Under the rules Spearow was allowed six attempts, but did not take his last two as he was forced to enter the broad and high jumps. Ray Dodge of the Aggies ran a fast race in the half mile, beating his teammate, Lee Sims, by a scant yard. Dodge's time was caught at 1:57 3-5, breaking his own record for the Oregon-Aggie dual meets of 1:58.

ELGIN PUPIL WINS SHEEP ESSAY PRIZE

SALEM, May 19.—Melvin Schnore, student in the department of vocational agriculture in Elgin high school of which William E. Cyrus is instructor, won first place in the contest established by Dave N. Waddell, of Amity, Oregon, for the best essay on Hampshire sheep. This was announced yesterday by E. E. Elliott, director for the state board for vocational education.

The contest is open to any farmer boy or girl in Oregon and essays were submitted from all parts of the state. Colonel Carl Abrams, editor of the Pacific Homestead of Salem, assisted in judging the essays and awarding the prize, which was a pair of Hampshire lambs. Last year the prize was won by George Miles, of Medford, who was a member of the Medford stock judging team at the Pacific International Livestock exposition and who already is recognized as a sheep breeder.

Melvin Schnore, winner for this year, is 16 years old.

RALPH BUDD IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, May 19.—Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern, here on an inspection trip, said that he hoped the Oregon Electric situation would be straightened out. He indicated that President Turner would announce Monday regarding the payment of the semi-annual bond interest due May 1. Budd said there was no prospect of extending the Portland, Astoria and Pacific branches to Tillamook. He said it was up to the timber owners to extend the logging roads to connect with this line.
