ments either in 1923 or 1924. The present number of chaplains in the army as of date March, 1923 is 125, of which number 21 are Roman Catholic and 104 are Protestant. Of the Protestant contingent, 14 are Presbyterian, that is, 11 of Presbyterian U. S. A., 2 Presbyterian U. S., and 1 Cumberland Presbyterian. In the navy there are 85 chaplains, of which 18 are Roman Catholics and 27 Protestants, of which number 11 are Presbyterian U. S. A. and 1 Cumberland Presbyterian. In the Officers' Reserve Corps 146 are Roman Catholics, and 490 are Protestant, of which latter number 76 are Presbyterian.

Dr. Brown Reports.—INDIANAPOLIS, May 19.—Dr. Arthur J. Brown, of New York, secretary of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions, today reported to the Board that the religious people of America, irrespective of denominational and political differences, should unite in the following course: "To endorse the informal cooperation which our government is now giving to the humanitarian and other technical organizations which are being efficiently managed by the League of Nations; and to urge upon the President and the Senate the importance of making this informal cooperation formal by the nomination and confirmation of delegates to those organizations which are carrying on work in which the United States was actively engaged before the world war.

"To urge the government to take immediate steps to bring the United States into real relationship with the other nations of the world, either through the League of Nations or through some effective form of association. "To commend cordially the proposed participation of the United States in the Permanent Court of International Justice, as recommended by President Harding in his message to Congress February 2, 1922. "To urge the President to call a conference of the nations to consider in the spirit of mutual goodwill and human brotherhood, the grave problems which still menace the very fabric of civilization—such as armaments, economic chaos and other obstacles to the peace of the world."

ARTHUR LATTIS DIES.—LOS ANGELES, May 19.—Arthur Lattis, vice president of the national council, Boy Scouts of America, owner of the Broadway department store and recognized as one of America's leading merchants, died here early Friday, after a short illness. He was 61 years old.

MRS. ORSDALL DEAD.—PORTLAND, May 19.—Mrs. Carrie C. Van Orsdall, founder and for 25 years grand guardian of the Neighbors of Woodcraft, well known today with headquarters in Portland, died this morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Carol Hennelgren, Melrum Station on the Oregon City line.

Mrs. Van Orsdall was stricken with illness two years ago and was forced to give up active control of the lodge, although she did not resign from her position until one year ago. She then made her home with her daughter.
