M'FARLAND MAY BE COLLECTOR

Senators McNary and Stanford Expected to Recommend His Name to Harding for Customs Job.

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, May 19.—It became definitely known here today that Senators Charles L. McNary and E. N. Stanford have agreed on Dr. Earl C. McFarland of Portland for collector of customs, and it is expected they will recommend his appointment to President Harding some time today or tomorrow.

It is expected the president will then make a recess appointment and confirmation will follow when congress reconvenes.

PORTLAND, May 19.—The agreement of the two senators on Dr. McFarland brings to a close a contest that has been waged for this office since the death of Collector of Customs George L. Piper on March 18—more than two months ago.

In the course of the contest various persons have been considered as probabilities.

Early in the contest Charles T. Early, prominent lumberman of the city, led, but as it progressed this star waned, and Sheriff T. M. Hurlbut of this city became the favorite.

Friends of O. H. Pithian, candidate for republican national committeeman in the last primary, then presented his name for consideration, although he was never an active candidate.

Senators End Deadlock.
Last week the two senators held a conference in Washington, but finding themselves unable to agree, they decided to further consider the matter. Since then Senator Stanford has been exchanging wires with Senator McNary, who is at Chicago, on the subject and, according to the foregoing dispatch from Washington, apparently agreed on Dr. McFarland.
