**STEAMER CALLS FOR AID.**  
(By Associated Press.)  
SANTIAGO, Chile, May 21.—A wireless message picked up at Valparaiso states that the 4000-ton cargo steamer *Presidente Alessandri* is in serious trouble 75 miles off Talca. The torpedo boat *Condell* has been dispatched at speed from Coquimbo, and the steamer *Frosini* has changed her course and is proceeding to the aid of the *Alessandri*.

### LUMBER TRADE CONTINUES LOW

This reduction in log supplies, however, is no longer a great worry, as the fair weather season is at hand, when logging can be more consistently maintained and reserves built.

The west coast mills still occupy a strong position, due principally to the enormous trade in home territory. Building in the Pacific Northwest is very active, mills reporting that they are selling 25 per cent. of their output locally, while some large producing centers say they must import lumber from other sections, their own mills being too heavily booked to be able to supply all requirements.

### Production at High Level

When allowance is made for the smaller number of working days in April, however, the rate of consumption in the two months is approximately equal.

The latter act is known as the oleomargarine law.

Two referendum measures have been filed with the secretary of state against the state income tax law, one by the Oregon Just Tax league and the other by the Oregon Income Tax Referendum League. This law will be referred to the voters for approval or rejection at a special election to be held in November of this year. The so-called oleomargarine law, not going a revenue measure, will not be before the voters until November, 1924.

this view, the general reaction in prices is an entirely normal reflection of a halt between buying movements.

**Better Prices Expected.**  
Such observers expect commodity prices again to stiffen as preparations are made for the fall trade. In general, however, the feeling is that it is still too early to judge whether the recent reaction has quite run its course. That the effect on general levels of the falling prices which have been holding the attention of the business community will be less than might be expected is argued on the basis of the behavior of the index published by the department of labor. The department's index for all commodities during April is unchanged as compared with March. Aside from a reaction in coal prices and in those of farm products, all of the individual groups of the index were higher.
