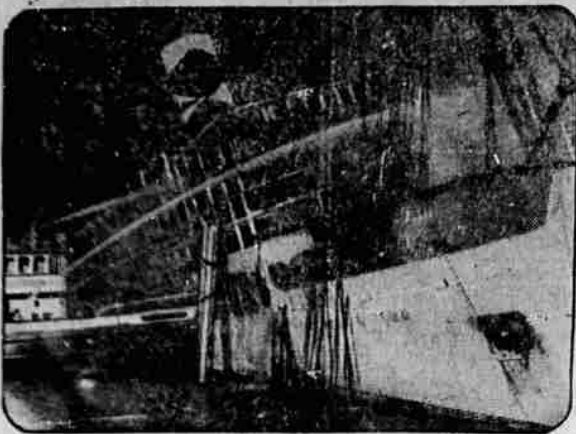

Says Changing Styles Menace Jewelry Trade

CHICAGO, May 23.—An attempt will be made by American jewelers this summer to dictate the jewelry styles of the future, according to P. J. Coffey, of Newark, N. J., who was recently chosen president of the National Jewelry Association.

"Jewelry styles have no authoritative source," said Mr. Coffey. "They

are largely accidental. A reigning Puritan actress whose ears are not pretty hides them with her hair; the feminine world buries its ears under a new coiffure, and long pendant earrings are the vogue.

"A man of fashion wears a jade stickpin to match a new scarf and everybody affects jade stickpins. The accidental discovery of an old pharaoh's tomb set going a craze for Egyptian jewelry. When this old king from his throne of 3,500 years ago, can dictate jewelry styles for America

it is time for jewelers to take concerted action to regulate styles which too long have been dominated by caprice and accident."

President Coffey was empowered by the National association to appoint a styles committee to report at the convention at Attleboro, Mass., next summer.

"The rapidity with which jewelry styles change," continued Mr. Coffey, "has become an important problem to jewelers. Following some fact of the moment, a jeweler lays in a stock of

jewelry which is rendered almost unsalable by a new fad that appeals to popular taste. These swift changes entail an enormous loss to the jewelry business."

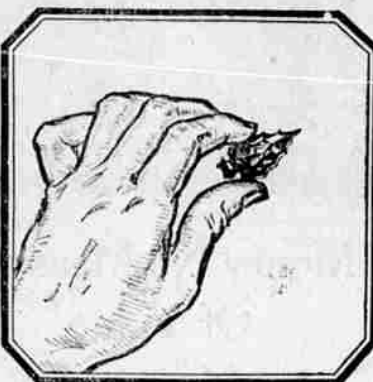

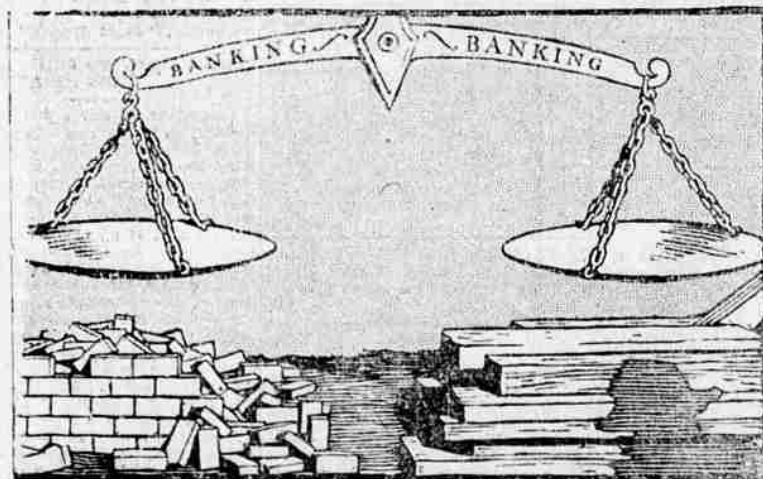
