New York—There is a new place today to wear the long necklace, especially the occasional long necklace.



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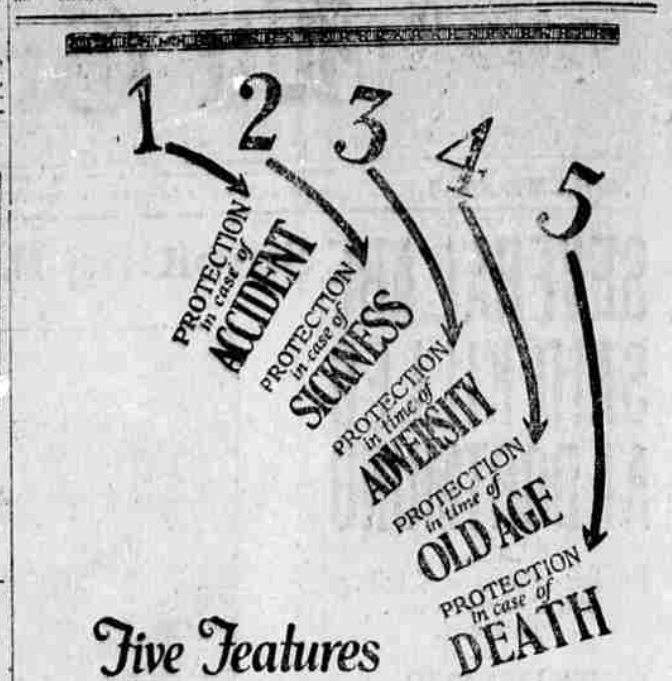
