Battle Of Moundsmen Anticipated

Baker-La Grande Contest Here Sunday Expected to Be Real Exhibition of Baseball.

Although La Grande lost to Baker in the opening game of the Intermountain baseball season, when the two teams meet again Sunday afternoon in La Grande, diamond fans are anticipating a bang-up contest between two evenly matched teams—nearly alike in hitting, fielding and pitching strength. Both teams are tied with Cove for first place in the Intermountain league and if Cove defeats Union the winner will still remain in a tie for first honors.

In pitching strength, McGee and Fosbury are practically on the same plane. Last year Baker won the championship but, facing Metcalf in two of the three contests, they were able to steal but 5 hits from his offerings. At Baker this year five hits was the best they could do. And when the season was over last year McGee led the Intermountain pitchers with more victories in proportion to defeats in the percentage column. At Baker this year the Pirates got five hits from Fosbury and since that day McGee has won two games while Fosbury has broken even, leaving them tied so far this season. Fans are looking forward to a pitching battle of a high nature when Fuzzy and Maggie clash again.

Hitting Even.

Both teams are on the same plane when it comes to hitting the old ball. Not only that but the Pirates have begun to regain their old stride that was in evidence all last season and with the batting broadsides once more coming from the Pirates' ship, there is a strong chance of Crown's outlasting Hunt's protection here.

Fielding honors are in the same deadlock as hitting and pitching strength. La Grande has a crack-jack of an infield with every man fast, working hard and pulling very few homers. In the outfield with Theisen, Crews and Rosenbaum as mainstays, these wells exist that are hard to evade.

Taken all in all, when the Colts romp down to La Grande one of the best games of the season should result. A large number of La Grande fans are expecting to be in attendance and a lot of support means quite a bit to the home team, too, when all is balanced.

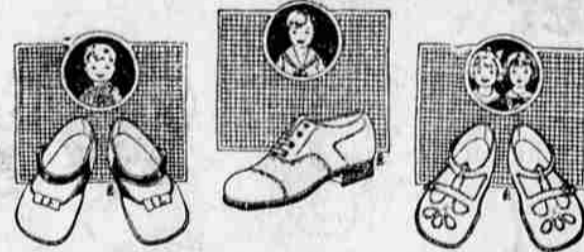
