BAKER, May 24.—The Bay Horse near Huntington is to become one of the big producing properties of the northwest. Newly elected trustees have plans for the development of large ore bodies and a milling plant. The announcement comes with considerable rejoicing as it adds greatly to the mining revival now taking place in Baker county. The news was contained in a wire received from H. F. Hendryx, editor of the Herald, who is attending the mining convention in Spokane. Following is the wire: "At meeting of the stockholders of H. F. Hendryx's company, operating the Bay Horse mine at Huntington, articles of incorporation were amended increasing the number of trustees from seven to nine members. J. P. Winter, A. L. Stephens, J. S. Beal, George P. Larson and Carl N. Anderson, of Portland; W. G. Fellows, of Spokane; J. L. Magney and W. R. Diehl, of Spokane; H. P. Miller, of the Bay Horse mine. The new trustees have plans for enlarged operations of the mine including development of ore bodies and a large milling plant."
