DEATH SADDENS LADD CANYON

LADD CANYON, May 24.—Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Peshler received a

night letter from Mr. John S. Buttner Wednesday telling the very sad news of the death of their daughter, Mrs. Geneva Buttner Childers.

The Buttner family were formerly residents of this neighborhood prior to their removal to Du Bois, Idaho, and were highly esteemed by all of us. Geneva attended school here until she was married to Mr. Childers, of Oakland, California, where she has always made her home, which was probably of three years duration. 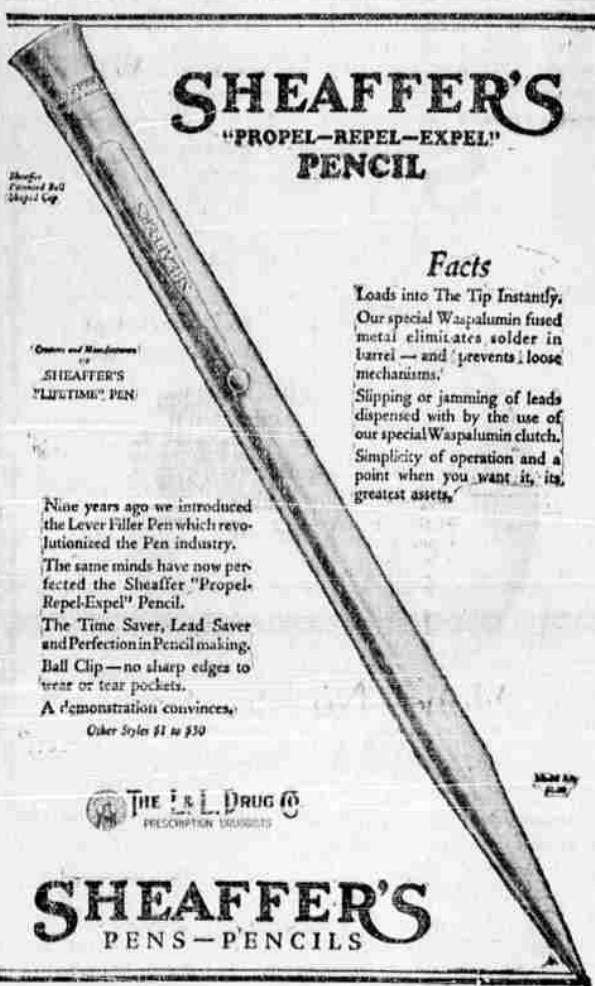
