Two Regulars May Be Off Team Sunday

Buck Knight to Be Out of City; Doubt Expressed Whether Theison Will Be Able to Play.

When the Colts play the Pirates here Sunday afternoon the La Grande team will have a slightly different line-up than on last Sunday. Buck Knight, regular shortstop, will not be in the city and there is also a possibility that Bud Theison, who injured his leg in the Union-La Grande game, will not be able to appear in his regular position in the left garden. However, even if Theison is unable to play, he will probably be at hand ready to pinch hit if necessary.

The line-up, as tentatively arranged, will be as follows: Manager, pitchers: Johnson, catcher: Garrity, first base: second base: Tee Knight, third base: shortstop: Theison, left field: Rosebaum centerfield: Crews, rightfield: J. Theison is able to play, second and short will be filled probably by Waite and Hager, although those positions are not positively decided upon. Providing Theison is out, some shift will necessarily be made.

In Grande's hitting and fielding strength will not be quite at par with both Theison and Knight, but Manager Crews believes that a sufficiently strong team can be mustered to waltz the Colts, nevertheless.

The game will be played at the fairgrounds, beginning at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon. Union will play Cove.

High School Athletes Gather for Track Meet

CHICAGO, May 25.—Olympic stars of the future, representing high schools and universities from more than 20 states, arrived here Thursday to compete in the 106th national interscholastic track and field championships to be held under the auspices of the University of Chicago, Friday and Saturday afternoon.

The meet drew a record-breaking entry of 1,250 athletes, of which 332 will compete in the high school section and 257 in the academy division. The meet will be run in two sections, one for academics and one for high schools, with a championship trophy for the winners of each division.

While not many eastern schools will be in the competition, the cream of the school boy athletes of the mid-west, south and far west are entered.

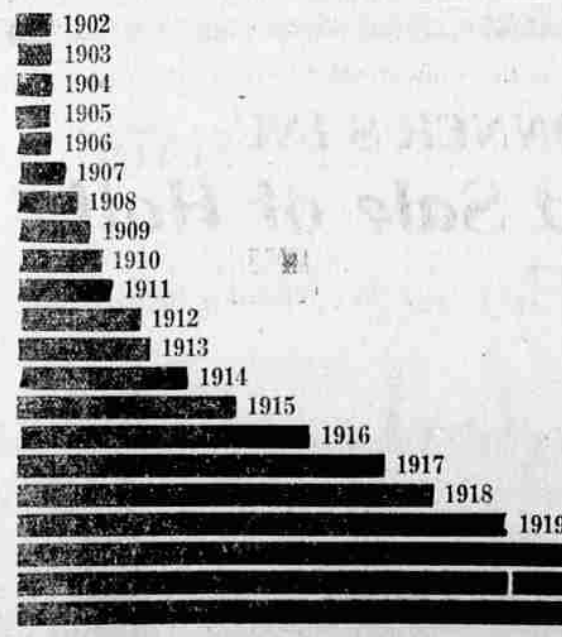
