Two Dead.

Two veterans, Charles O'Neil, of O'Neil's, Calif., aged 91, and Jordan Jerelham of Portland, Ore., aged 92, died on the eve of the seventy-fifth anniversary of the close of the Mexican War.

Enoch W. Conyers.

Enoch W. Conyers, a veteran of the Mexican war and pioneer of Oregon, lives at Clatskanie, Ore., where he settled nearly seventy years ago.

Conyers was born Dec. 2, 1828, at Carlyle, Ky., and at the age of three moved with his parents to Quincy, Ill.

At the age of seventeen he enlisted as a private in Captain Morgan's company at the outbreak of the war of 1846 and served until the close, having taken part in the battle of Buena Vista.

He returned to Quincy and then took the first telegraph instrument into Iowa, which he operated for a year at Keokuk.

Mr. Conyers was in the Oregon legislature the year that that state was admitted to statehood. He cast the deciding ballot that elected James W. Nesmith, first governor of Oregon. Fifty years later, Mr. Conyers again served in the Oregon legislature.

John McCreedy.

John McCreedy, of Lebanon, Ore., one of the oldest men in the state, weighs 200 pounds and is hale and hearty despite his 95 years. He was born August 16, 1825, near Pittsburg, Pa., and as a youth ran away from home to join the United States Marine force.

He served on the U. S. S. Ohio and U. S. S. Warren during the war of 1846-48.

Robert Starkey.

Robert Starkey resided at Marshfield, Ore., and was 94 years old in December, 1922. He lives alone and is still quite sturdy and goes about the city with as much ease as a younger man.

He complains only that his eyesight is gradually failing.

Mr. Starkey was in New Orleans when the call came for volunteers in the Mexican war. He enlisted in the United States Navy and served under Admiral Porter.

He took part in the blockade of Vera Cruz and recalls the capture of that city after a bombardment of three days. When the war was over Mr. Starkey went to Norfolk, Va., where he was transferred to the ship of war St. Mary, on which he made a trip around Cape Horn to Monterey, Cal., in the fall of 1848.

From Monterey the vessel went to San Pedro with money for the troops stationed there and took

aboard a company of dragoons who had come over the Santa Fe trail with General Lane, who was on his way to Oregon to be governor. Mr. Starkey was discharged in San Francisco when his enlistment in the navy expired.

Most of the boys are gone. But he lives on to see another Decoration Day.

General Pierce, now 92, is spending his last days at Reed's Lake sanatorium, near here. He was born September 20, 1829, in East Bloomfield, Ontario County, N. Y.

Entering the Third Michigan Infantry, at the outbreak of the war, as captain of company K, he rose by leaps and bounds. When he was mustered out, he was a brevet major general.

General Pierce was a fighter of first caliber. In different engagements he was wounded in both legs and both arms. At Fair Oaks his horse was shot from under him.

Became a Dentist.

In his youth, General Pierce was employed in his father's woolen mills. Then he became a dentist.

After the war he entered the clothing business with a brother in Grand Rapids. From 1887 to 1891 he was commandant of the Michigan Soldiers' Home.

Twice he was department commander of the Michigan Grand Army of the Republic. For many years he was an officer of the Loyal Legion. His wife died nearly six years ago.

A brother, Frederick, died in the service during the war. Another brother, Captain Edwin S. Pierce, was wounded twice. A third brother, Lieutenant Silas K. Pierce, was in the cavalry. Major H. C. Grant, a brother-in-law, was army paymaster general.

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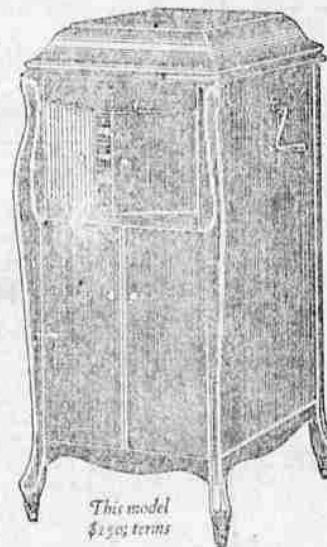
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
