ROAD CONDITIONS IN EASTERN OREGON

Conditions of the roads in many sections in Eastern Oregon, due to heavy rains yesterday and today, should probably be in a somewhat worse state than does the report of the state highway office, completed Friday, show. If attempting to make the trip over the Blue Mountains or negotiate the stretch of road this side of Elgin, it would be well to inquire locally before embarking in the car.

The report for highway conditions in Eastern Oregon is as follows:

Old Oregon Trail—East of Pendleton.

Ontario - Huntington - Baker - La Grande-Mecham: Macadamized entire distance and in excellent condition.

Meacham-Deadman's Pass: Approximately five miles new grade which is rough but passable; remainder excellent macadam.

Deadman's Pass-Pendleton: Excellent macadam.

Old Oregon Trail—West of Pendleton.

Columbia River Highway section: Pendleton - Umatilla - Arlington - The Dalles: Macadamized entire distance.

The Dalles - Mosier - Hood River - Cascade Locks-Portland: Paved entire distance.

Portland - Scappoose - Deer Island - Rainier - Clatskanie - Astoria - Seaside: Paved entire distance except one mile through city of Rainier where paving operations are underway. Take detour over old macadamized road one block south of highway.

La Grande-Joseph Highway.

La Grande-Island City: Paved.

Island City-Alleel: Excellent macadam.

Alleel-Imbler: New grade in fair condition.

Imbler-Elgin: Old road over hill very rough but passable.

Elgin-Minam-Lostine: Macadamized and in excellent condition.

Lostine - Enterprise: Under construction; turn off at Waile's crossing and take hill road to Enterprise.

Enterprise-Joseph: Excellent macadam.

Baker-Cornucopia Highway.

Baker-Halfway: 19 miles macadam; 21 miles graded roadbed; balance fair county road. New grade on lower Powder River between Love

Bridge and Black Bridge, now open to traffic.

Oregon-Washington Highway
Pendleton-Washington State Line: Paved.

Pendleton-Pilot Rock: 5 miles of good earth road; 10 miles macadam.

Pilot Rock-Vinson: 15.7 miles macadam in good condition.

Vinson-Butter Creek-Jones Hill: County road. Very rough and rocky but passable.

Jones Hill-Heppner: Standard grade in good condition.

Heppner-Gilliam County Line: Entire distance macadamized and in excellent condition.

Gilliam County Line-Heppner Junction: Good condition except where surfacing operations are underway. Careful driving required. Watch out for caution signs.
