

### UNION CHURCH MEETINGS HELD

UNION, June 2. — No preaching services were held at the Methodist church last Sunday owing to the Union meeting held both morning and evening. In the fourth both sides secured one run and in the fifth Cove scored her eighth tally. Union then put Greenwood in the box and Cove piled up five more dots in the score books before the side was retired. From then on the game was in the air. One score in the sixth and three in the ninth made a total of five for the Federals while Cove's total was 14. Brazil occupied the box for Cove during the nine innings and struck out five men. Union used three pitchers, Hansen, Greenwood and Wardell. Two of these were only high school boys, Hansen of Union and Wardell of Cove. Cove got eleven hits, two of them homers, three two-baggers and the others singles.

The Federals secured only five hits off Brazil. Union goes to Baker next Sunday with her lineup strengthened if present plans materialize. Sand has been placed along each side of the pavement through Union, except where the pavement is full width of the street. ### NOTICE OF HEARING ON PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Commission of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, proposes and intends to improve Improvement District No. 124 in the City of La Grande, Oregon, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor heretofore adopted by the Commission, and that the report of the committee on estimates for said improvement is now on file in the office of the Recorder of the City of La Grande, Oregon, that the said Commission has set Wednesday, the 29th day of June, 1923, at 2:30 o'clock p. m., of said day, at the Commission Room in the City Building in La Grande, Oregon, as the time and place when and where said Commission will meet and hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievance of any persons against said proposed improvement and the proposed assessment therefor against the property to be benefited thereby in said district.

That the boundaries of the district to be improved and benefited by the said proposed improvement are as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point on the center line of the alley in Block 123 of Chaplin's Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon, which is opposite the common corner to lots 7 and 8 in said Block 123, and 300 feet from the center line of Greenwood Street and running thence northwesterly along the center line of said alley to a point

on the center line of the alley in Block 124, which is 296 feet from the center line of Greenwood Street; thence southwesterly on a line 296 feet from and parallel with the center line of Greenwood Street to the center line of Adams Avenue; thence southeasterly along the center line of Adams Avenue to a point 212.9 feet southeasterly from the center line of Greenwood Street; thence northeasterly on a line 212.9 feet from and parallel with the center line of Greenwood Street to the center line of Jefferson Avenue; thence southeasterly along the center line of Jefferson Avenue to a point 260 feet from the center line of Greenwood Street; thence northeasterly on a line 260 feet from and parallel with the center line of Greenwood Street to the place of beginning, all within the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon.

That the said proposed improvement will consist of grading to the proper subgrade and constructing thereon hard surface pavement fifty-six (56) feet in width between curb lines on Greenwood Street from the north property line of Adams Avenue to the north property line of Madison Avenue (excepting the O. W. R. & N. Company's right of way and Jefferson Avenue street intersection) and including one full street intersection at Madison Avenue; also by constructing concrete sidewalks where same are not in place, combination curb and gutter where not in place, concrete gutters where curbs are in place, catch basins, etc., and by laying sewer pipes, manhole frames and covers, on the above named street, all located in Chaplin's Addition to the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon. The above named improvements are to be made at the expense of the property in said Improvement District that will be especially benefited thereby, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor adopted and now on file in the office of the City Recorder of said City.
