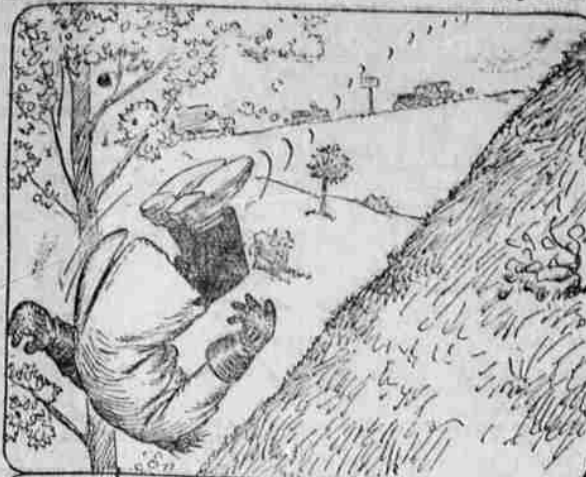

LAURETTE TAYLOR GREAT AS FILM "PEG"

Noted Star Readers Delightful Characterization of Famous Irish Lass.

Laurette Taylor, who won the hearts of a million people with her famous characterization of the delightful Peg in J. Hartley Manners' play, "Peg O' My Heart," was again seen in her celebrated role and it is safe to assert that the star has endeared herself even more to the vast American audience, which is certain to flock to see this film.

As a stage play, "Peg O' My Heart" has had one of the most phenomenal runs in theatrical history. It has had 6,500 performances in the United States alone. It has been played in England, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India, Hawaii, Italy, Czechoslovakia and Paris.
