Episcopal Church

Simple Answers to Common Questions About the Church
 (To Be Continued)
Why Do You Not Exchange Pulpits With Other Ministers?
 To insure correct teaching, the church has ordered that only Ministers having Apostolic Ordination shall officiate in our parishes.
Does Not This Oppose and Retard Christian Unity?
 Such exchanges have existed for years among the modern Protestant bodies with no apparent effect in uniting them. There are many ways in which there may be harmonious Christian work without the sacrifice of principle. This Church stands in the very forefront in seeking Christian unity, and was the first to suggest a basis. It has officially set forth four simple points which it regards as essential to unity.

What Are These Four Points?
 1. The Holy Scriptures. 2. The Apostles and Nicene Creeds. 3. The Two Sacraments. 4. The Historic Episcopate.
What Would Be the Effect of Agreement Here?
 Instead of many conflicting sects of Christians there would be one great Church throughout the world, such as existed before divisions began. Think of the marvelous power such a United Church would exercise now in the world!
Why Do You Baptize Infants?
 Because the Old Covenant, as well as the New Covenant, expressly includes infants. The Saviors received them and bade them to be received. The New Testament clearly implies (if it does not command) their baptism. The early Church universally practiced it. This school church for over 1,500 years baptized children. Today more than 97 per cent of the Christians of the world believe in and practice infant baptism. This demands from the 3 per cent who object to it, if their position is to be accepted, a direct Scriptural prohibition, which of course, cannot be found.

What Is the Relation of the Baptized Child to the Church?
 Every baptized child is a member of the church. He is to be trained in the Church in all such things as a Christian should know for his soul's health; and then at the proper age—say, about 12 years—should be confirmed, so becoming a full communicant.
Is Confirmation "Joining the Church?"
 No. Confirmation is not joining the church, nor making a profession of religion, nor only a renewing of vows. We may join a Woman's club, an Odd Fellows' lodge, or a debating society, but we do not join a family or household, which God's church is. We are born or adopted into a family, grafted into the Body of Christ, His church. We do not join it, as we would a political club.

What, Then, Is Confirmation?
 Confirmation is the "Laying on of Hands," told of in Acts, Chap. VIII, and elsewhere. Through this comes a blessing of grace and spiritual strength from God, the Holy Ghost, to help in daily living the Christian life. The church has continued this rite from the days of the Apostles.

LIVESTOCK ON UPWARD TREND

 three months and are now beginning to decline. Up to May 15, approximately 175,000 lambs had been shipped from that state. Shipments of lambs from the northern states of the district do not commence in volume until about June 1.
 The total receipts of all classes of livestock at eight principal markets in the district during the first four months of 1923 were sixteen per cent greater than during the same period of 1922. Cattle and calves showed an increase of 17.5 per cent, hogs 27.8 per cent, and sheep, 6.2 per cent. The large increase in receipts of hogs reflects, in part, the increased production of hogs in this district during the last year as compared to the previous year. To a greater extent, however, it represents an increase in the importation of hogs into this district from other areas.
 At the principal livestock markets of the district, approximately sixty-five per cent of the hogs received during this period came from outside the Twelfth Federal Reserve district.
 During April, 1923, receipts of livestock were smaller than during March, 1923, but accepting sheep, they were greater than during April, 1922. Receipts of sheep were practically the same as in April, 1922. Prices for cattle in the principal markets of this district tended to advance during the past month, while prices of hogs, lambs and sheep declined slightly.
 Shearing of wool proceeded rapidly during April and the first two weeks in May. Fleeces are generally proving to have been well grown and of good quality, a reflection on the favorable weather during the last season. Estimated good grade wool placed the 1923 wool crop in the district at 75,750,000 pounds, a 3.5 per cent increase over previous estimates, but an increase of 8.2 per cent over the 1922 crop of 70,225,000 pounds.
 "Buying of wool became active as shearing proceeded, and it is estimated that more than seventy-five per cent of the total clip in this district had been sold on May 15. Present present prices to growers range from forty cents per pound for the lower grades of wool to fifty-five for the best quality. At a recent sale of

500,000 pounds of wool held in Northern California, the top price paid was 53 1-2 cents per pound."
