"The delegates boarded cars and drove to Ashland Wednesday morning where they were the guests of the Women's City Improvement club. A noon picnic followed at Lillian park and in the afternoon the Americanization department was conducted with Miss Vella Winner presiding. That the American flag should be in a conspicuous place in every school room was stressed and a fine report of the work for crippled children was given by Mrs. P. La Campbell, of Eugene. Mrs. G. J. Frankel told of the work of the White Cross and Mrs. Julia Spooner mentioned the research work and guidance being conducted in the public schools.

"We drove back to Medford in the afternoon and in the evening heard a splendid address 'Things we think things others think and what we think and what we think of the things others think,' by Mr. Bede, president

of the state editorial association. Thursday morning the legislation department, with Mrs. Alexander Thompson presiding, was conducted, also a symposium by the Portland grade teachers association with Miss Julia Spooner presiding.

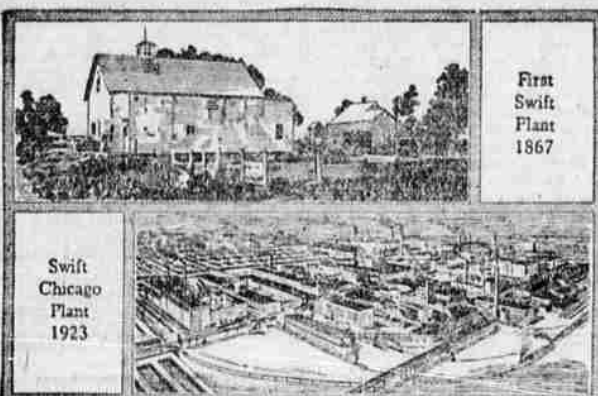
