## Prairie City Lads Wallop Imbler Boys

### Rush Work on Pageant

LOS ANGELES, June 5.—Construction of the picturesque pageant which is to honor the American Historical Society and Motion Picture Exposition, scheduled to open here July 2, has begun and three shifts of workmen soon will be placed on the project to rush it to completion.

Meanwhile an historical commission consisting of 13 college presidents and historians, is drafting the scenario for the pageant which will depict outstanding events in the history of both Americans, presenting them in the form of a dramatic narrative. Having thus provided for historical accuracy, the hundred or more producing organizations making up the motion picture industry will turn over to their corps of skilled technicians, artists, directors and actors the prodigious task of staging and filming the review.

### HARDING DONATES TROPHY

NEW YORK, June 5.—President Harding has donated a cup to be known as the Warren G. Harding trophy, emblematic of the American public links championship. J. P. Staudaher, Jr., chairman of the public links committee of the United States Golf association, announced Monday.

The cup will be placed in competition Monday, June 25, the day preceding the qualifying rounds of the 1923 national public links championship at Washington. Teams of four players, each team representative of a city, will compete at medal play over 18 holes.

The trophy is to be in competition annually thereafter under the same conditions.

### Aero Map Finished

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5.—An aero map of the city and San Francisco, believed to be the largest ever made, was recently exhibited here as the work of G. E. Russell, commercial aviator, and assistants. The map, measuring about ten feet by eight, is a composite of 172 exposures and 475 prints, all taken from an elevation of about three miles. Nine months were required for its completion.

The area covered is about 70 square miles, which includes the city, part of San Francisco bay, the Golden Gate and extending out into the Pacific.

Every important building and landmark in the city is distinguishable on the aero-photo map.

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## 4 UNITS MAKE UP PAGEANTRY

(By Associated Press)

WALLA WALLA, Wash., June 5.—Two thousand people, sons and daughters of early pioneers, will reproduce Northwestern historical events, with fitting allegory and symbolism in the pioneer pageant, "How the West Was Won," which will be presented here Wednesday and Thursday, under direction of Percy J. Burrell of Boston, original producer of "The Wayfarer."

The book of the pageant was written by Dr. S. B. D. Penrose, president of Whitman college, and the whole entertainment is intended by its originators to mark the 75th anniversary of the massacre of Marcus Whitman and to illustrate how the history of the entire Northwest is interwoven with the history of the Walla Walla valley.

Four Movements.  
The pageant is divided into four units, or movements. The first taken up the years of exploration and settlement from 1804 to 1847, and will show the Lewis and Clark expedition meeting the Indians, the coming of the Hudson Bay company and the early voyagers. The Whitman massacre will be shown by dances instead of by imitation.

Indian wars will be the subject of movement two. It will show the defeat of Colonel Steptoe, and the victory of Colonel Wright over the Indian tribes.

Picturesque Walla Walla of Early days, as the typical frontier town, is the subject of the third movement. Growth of town, church, school and railroad will be depicted and various scenes will represent the colorful life and action from 1850 to 1873.

The "Spirit of the Valley," a beautiful and striking woman, will preside over these first three movements. As she sits enthroned on one side of the main program field, she will teach lessons in Americanism in answer to questioning from the three youths—American, Italian and Russian.

The fourth movement is symbolic. "The Spirit of the Mountain Top," in the form of a man, mounted on a white horse, will show the valley's future by means of three visions. A hundred and fifty dancers, as the "fruits of the earth," will interpret the spirit's first vision, and the

Seven Become Citizens.  
PENDLETON, June 5.—Several applicants were admitted to United States citizenship here today in the circuit court. Twelve applications had been presented. Three petitioners did not appear, two cases were continued for cause, one man having been refused citizenship without prejudice for the fifth time because he had not yet sufficiently studied American government principles.

Those admitted were Albert Nels Sjostro of Hermiston, a native of Sweden and later a British subject; William A. McClelland of Pendleton, English; Joseph Parks of Pendleton, English; William Martin of Fresno, English; Colin McEwen of Milton, English; Claus Frederick Scher of Echo, German, and his wife, Gladys Scheer, who lost her natural rights in citizenship by marriage.

WALLOWA, June 5.—With the closing of the school year, the plans for the coming year are now taking form. Superintendent J. M. Eaman has been organizing his faculty and practically all the teachers' contracts have now been signed. A seventh grade teacher remains to be hired, but the list otherwise will include: Lenore Fuller, first grade; Agathe Marvin, second; Helen Owsley, third; Ruth Oliver, fourth; Duicel Oliver, fifth; R. L. Hendon, sixth; Janette Wilberholt, eighth. In the high school faculty the work has not been definitely apportioned, but will probably be as follows: Ella Allen, domestic art; A. W. Leavitt, commercial and athletic coach; Myrtle McEwen, history; Lillian Woody, English and language; S. T. Blik, agriculture; Mabel A. Bullis, domestic science; J. M. Eaman, mathematics; Miss Mason comes to the Wallowa school from Lostine. Miss Allen has

been teaching at Elgin, and will show the domestic department with Mrs. Bullis. Both teachers will also have other subjects. A. W. Leavitt, who will be the commercial teacher and athletic coach, has been teaching at Rosalia, Washington, was selected from a number of applicants by Mr. Eaman. Miss Marvin, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Marvin of this city, graduated this year from the normal school at Lewiston, Idaho.
