## AUTOMATIC IS TO BE BARRED

(By Associated Press) MALAD, Idaho, June 7.—Governor Charles C. Moore of Idaho is in favor of abolition of shotgun as one means of protecting migratory birds. While here recently he said he believed a large number of Idahoans feel the same way about it. "There is no question as to the destructiveness of the automatic," the governor declared. "No one will deny the toll of this arm is greater than that of any other shotgun, that it occasions more ruthless slaughter and certainly be roason of the wild anxiety of the user to empty as fast as possible the entire magazine; it is the cause of more crippled birds never recovered by the hunter which eventually die and are of no benefit whatsoever. "The farmer, merchant, professional man; in fact, thinking people from every walk of life have for years agitated this question, and I believe I am safe in saying that at least ninety per cent of the true lovers of wild life in Idaho are in favor of the prohibition of the use of the automatic shotgun."

## Fashion Notes
