## UNION COUPLE ARE MARRIED

**UNION, June 9**—Ralph Morgan who has been connected with the Union High School for the past three years as agriculture teacher, and Miss Ida Bellus, who just finished her first year as primary teacher in the Union school, were united in wedlock last Monday and were married. They returned to Union, intending to keep the matter a secret, but the news soon leaked out. Mr. Morgan came here from Corvallis and during his stay in Union has made many friends. Marshal Van Houten reports that the city property on Main street is being occupied more than usually the last few days, most of the guests arriving via the bootleg route. Several young, apparently pretty, women in the week and the city plans to keep the streets as free as possible from such characters during the convention and stock show days.

Union and Baker crossed bats at Baker grounds Sunday afternoon in a game that evened out and also well seasoned by several examples of fast baseball. Union secured a good lead in the first inning, when two was put out at first. Jerob went to first on a clean hit, then Sutherland, the Baker pitcher played nigger baby with the next two men up, McCann and Bloom. Spencer and Goodford reached the first sack on errors in fielding. Jerob, McCann and Bloom crossing home plate before Haines and Cobb were put out on bases. This was Union's only scoring till the ninth. Baker got two singles, and one run in the third, and in the fifth they began hitting Haines and piled up eight tallies before the side was retired. This landslide included one homer, one three sucker, two doubles and three single hits. Greer making the circuit and bringing in two more of the eight runs. Practically all this score was piled up after Baker had two men out. In the sixth Union put Jerob in the box and Baker substituted Giffman for Robertson. Jerob struck out the first man up, but the bats pulled in two more scores in this inning. Then Jerob struck out four men in the next two innings. Union was getting hits but they were scattered and no runs were scored. In the ninth Fleetwood, the first man up got a single, Greenstein secured a double and these two men crossed the plate. Then McCann was put out at first. Sutherland walked Bloom, but Spencer drove out a one base hit and soon three more men reached home. Goodford struck out, but the next two men, Haines and Cobb, redeemed their batting record by making safe hits. Another man was retired and the game was over. The score standing Baker 11, Union 8. The two men loaned to the visitors by Baker, Cobb and Fleetwood, were real sports and played the game as if they had been on their own team, even when Union rallied in the ninth and brought in five scores. Robertson pitched the entire game for Baker, and aside from the first and last inning, put on a good brand of tossing. He and Haines each allowed only one base on balls. Sutherland struck out 4 men, Haines 1, and Jerob, although in the box only three innings struck out 5 men. The outcome of the game was a surprise to Union as they were disappointed by not having a pitcher. Manager Spencer understood that a man was in Baker ready to go in the box, but when the boys reached the grounds, he had failed to show up. Using two of their pitchers in the ninth inning of a real thriller, and losing by so small a margin was much better than they expected.
