Dance Halls Regulated.
OLYMPIA, Wash., June 12.—Reg-

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representatives of the Ministerial Association of Olympia were in attendance for the hearing this afternoon, when the board of county commissioners adopted rules and regulations for the public dance halls in Thurston county outside incorporated towns.

Regulations provide an annual license fee of \$50, quarterly \$15 and a fine of \$5. The license is made responsible for the full observance of the law and the regulations. The presence of persons in or about the licensed dance hall who have intoxicating liquor or are intoxicated is cause for revocation of license.

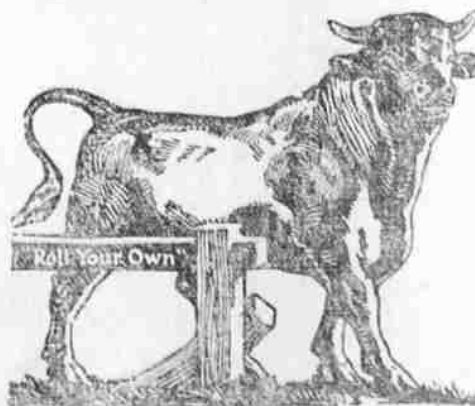
