Head Lettuce Being Planted--
Charlie McDaniel, banker at Wallatowa, is in La Grande today on his way home from Endicott, Washington, where he had been on business. He says the wheat fields in Washington surely look good and that the average this year is very large. Mr. McDaniel has considerable faith in the head lettuce experiment which Wallatowa county is entering upon this year. Statistics show that climatic conditions are just right and the soil is especially adapted to growing the plant. About 400 acres of ground is now ready for seeding and as soon as the rains cease the crop will be planted.

Animal Inspector Here--
Elmer G. Pitt, assistant predatory animal inspector of the Bureau of Biological Survey is here for a short time from Portland visiting counties in Eastern Oregon to see how much they expect to put up to cooperate with the state and federal government for the control of predatory animals. The bounty was taken off at the last legislature and \$40,000 was appropriated for use in counties where they are willing to match the amount. The government also expects to match the county amount and make it a three way proposition. In the past month six counties have been visited and each has raised a sum of from \$500.00 to \$2,000.00 according to the number of predatory animals in the county. Coyotes in Union county could be successfully controlled if the county would put up \$1,000.00 to be matched by the state and the government. This amount is sufficient to take care of the situation of Union county. All returns from the sale of furs in this work shall be used in furthering the work in the county. They are having great success with badger which is stretching across so as to be tasteless. It is a matter of getting it out to the different parts of the county in good shape.
