

BULGARIAN EX-PREMIER IS KILLED

Stamboulisky Meets Death While Attempting to Escape Pursuers.

INTERVENTION IS BEING DISCUSSED

Little Entente Contemplate Armed Intervention, Is Report; Jugo Slav Attitude Peaceful.

(By Associated Press.)
SOFIA, June 15.—Former Premier Stamboulisky, of Bulgaria, has been killed while trying to escape. He was captured yesterday at Molavi, a village near Slavovitz. Stamboulisky, the peasant leader was overthrown last Saturday when a coalition of the government took charge.

Talks of Intervention.
LONDON, June 15.—Belgrade dispatches to the Times says that armed intervention in Bulgaria by the Little Entente is openly mentioned in Belgrade among the general public who demand decisive action. The attitude of the Jugo Slav government toward the Bulgarian revolutionaries, however, continued peaceful.

Denies Report.
SOFIA, June 15.—The Bulgarian agency Thursday gave out a semi-official reading:

"Contrary to the insidious reports emanating from interested foreign centers, perfect order has been re-established throughout the country. The feeble resistance of Stamboulisky's partisans has been definitely crushed. Significant of the confidence the new government enjoys abroad is the continued rise of the leva."

LAGRADE MAY GET CONVENTION

WILL REORGANIZE RICHLAND BANK

BAKER, June 15.—As the result of a mass meeting held at Richland on Tuesday approximately \$25,000 was raised by residents of that section to be used in a reorganization of the Eagle Valley State bank which recently closed its doors. The meeting was reported to have been the largest in the point of attendance in the history of the valley and was presided over by Joseph F. Digney, of this city. Senator W. H. Strayer was also in attendance. New officers and new directors will be selected for the reorganized bank. It is reported and definite announcements are expected within a few days.

"For the reason that he has been grossly extravagant as such public official in the management and conduct of the municipal affairs of the City of Sumpter, has subjected the taxpayers to heavy burdens and by his acts and his incompetence, to longer held said office of mayor and commissioner."

Crude Oil on S. P. Stops Caterpillars

MADISON, Wis., June 15. (AP)—The Tucker bill, providing for the repeal of the Severyn prohibition enforcement in Wisconsin, finally passed the assembly today by a vote of 39 to 35. Now it goes to the "irrepressible."

Feed Liquor to Fish.
NEW YORK, June 15. (AP)—The steamship George Washington, which sailed from Europe after the ruling prohibiting bringing liquor into American ports after June 10th, arrived off Sandy Hook today with 87 cases more than the passengers had been able to consume. The liquor was thrown overboard.

CONFIDENT OF RENOMINATION OF PRESIDENT

Senator Borah Sees No Material Opposition for Harding; Replies to Attack of Legion Chief.

POCATELLO, Ida., June 15.—That President Harding would be renominated by acclamation at the next Republican convention, is the conviction of Senator W. E. Borah, of Idaho, who was here Thursday. "I know of no material opposition," he added. The senator further expressed the hope that the president would visit some of the complete going reclamation projects of the country, that he might see for himself what is being done to reclaim arid lands. "It would prove tremendous advantage to him and to the country," he added.

Replies to Owsley.
When his attention was called to the attack made upon him by Commander Alvin Owsley, of the American Legion, because of his opposition to the bonus bill, Senator Borah said:

"I do not care to say anything other than that I did what I thought was right. It was a serious thing to put a debt of four or five million dollars upon this country at a time when farms and homes were being sold for taxes, and I could not do it. I am willing to submit the justice of my position to the Legion boys themselves. So far as the disabled men are concerned, I have always and will always vote liberally to help them. There is nothing which they need which I am not willing to vote for. But for those who were fortunate to escape unhurt, I feel that we ought to take into consideration the condition of the country, the taxpayers, and all pull out together."

Senator Borah addressed the state convention of Elks here Thursday, being a charter member of Holme lodge. He goes to High Friday to speak at the Pioneer day celebration. He will be in the state until October.

MARTIN WILCOX IS CALLED BY REAPER

Friends and relatives of Martin Wilcox were saddened this morning when he passed on at 6:30 o'clock at the termination of a two week illness. He was 72 years, five months and seven days of age at the time of his demise and leaves his widow and four children.

La Grande Attorney Is Honored at Annual Convention of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Oregon.

PORTLAND, June 15.—George T. Cochran, an attorney of La Grande, was chosen grand master at the 73d annual convention of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Oregon, held yesterday in the Multnomah hotel. Mr. Cochran succeeded George G. Brown of Salem, and with other newly-elected officers will be installed at the session today.

By virtue of the election of Mr. Cochran as grand master, O. P. Cochran of Roseburg was advanced to the post of deputy grand master, Percy R. Kelly of Albany was advanced to grand senior warden and Edgar H. Senech of Portland was elected from the floor to the office of grand junior warden. John B. Cleland of Portland and D. R. Cheney of Forest Grove were re-elected, respectively, to the offices of grand treasurer and grand secretary.

Following the election of officers, which was held immediately after the luncheon hour, the grand lodge adjourned its session and the delegates, in mass, witnessed the Rose Festival parade from the Multnomah hotel. After the parade they again went into session for a discussion of matters pertaining exclusively to the well being of the Masonic bodies in the state.

The installation of the officers will be held today. This ceremony will be at 10 o'clock in the Multnomah hotel and final adjournment will follow shortly thereafter.

Shelby Bankers Frantic.

GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 15. DENVER, June 15. (AP)—The strike of railroad shopmen of the entire Denver and Rio Grande Western railroad system and on the Rio Grande southern, effective tomorrow, affecting nearly 5,000 men, was called today.

PROGRESS IN BUILDING IS VERY STEADY

New Construction in Style in La Grande; Similar Conditions Exist All Over Pacific Coast.

As in the case throughout the Pacific Coast region, building in La Grande this year, while not exactly booming, is advancing ahead with a steady progress that is far above normal. New construction is being contemplated by many and many have even gone ahead to make preparations although they have not actually begun work as yet.

According to Mrs. E. M. Fowler, city treasurer, building permits to the extent of \$128,740.00 have been issued this year since January 1 until today. Three of these permits called for buildings worth over \$10,000 one of them providing for a \$25,000 building.

Showing a gain of 37 per cent over the May record of 1922 and 9 per cent over that of April of this year, the building permits issued during May in 25 Pacific Coast cities total \$42,042,794 and indicate a more steady advancement in building operations than is observed in other parts of the country, as shown by the national building survey of S. W. Straus & Co. From the reports of 216 cities tabulated in this report, it is shown that the country, as a whole, gained 15 and 1-2 per cent over May, of 1922 in the total of building projected, but decreased by 12 per cent from the totals of April.

Los Angeles Leads.

Los Angeles, with a total of \$18,926,883, led all western cities by a gain over April of 23 per cent and over its record of last May of 120 per cent. Steady increase in population and a continually increasing demand for housing is partially responsible for this building program although an unprecedented volume of commercial construction is thereby under way.

VANCOUVER WINS FESTIVAL HONORS

PORTLAND, June 15.—Portland's Rose Festival classic the Floral parade was held Thursday under sunny skies, and along streets lined with thousands of people.

More floats were entered than ever before. Vancouver, B. C. won first prize for out of state entries. Lewiston, Idaho took second place. For the Oregon towns, first prize went to Newberg with Seaside second.

Thursday closed the festival proper but a postponed parade of school children will be held Friday.

W. C. KELLEY TO BUILD CHURCH

Presbyterian Building Bids Are Opened; New Church to Be of Brick Construction.

Contractors' proposals were opened in the office of Architect C. R. Miller yesterday for the construction of the new Presbyterian church of this city. They were as follows:

Construction Plans

The building when completed will have a floor space of 42x81, of brick construction, pitched roofs and gables, ornamental memorial windows, full basement and entrance tower. The basement will have the banquet room, kitchen, lavatories, heating and fuel rooms and organ machine room. For the basement will have both interior and exterior entrances.

The main floor will have Sunday school rooms, community room, pastor's study, choir loft and pulpit, and will also contain the balcony with a seating capacity of 100, entrance to the balcony to be from the entrance tower.

On the opposite end from the balcony will be the organ and choir loft over the pulpit.

Fine Auditorium.

The entire main auditorium will be finished plain in white plaster, with vaulted ceiling trimmed with ornamental plaster molding and will be trimmed with concealed lighting, no lights of any kind will be exposed in this room, and all angles will be rounded to perfect the acoustical effects of this auditorium.

Entrance will be off Sixth street through the tower and on entering the tower one may go to any portion of the entire building without going through the main auditorium.

The building can be entirely opened up with all departments into one large room and the seating capacity will be 500.

GENERAL LUIS TERRAZAS IS DEAD TODAY

Famous Mexican Cattle King of Former Times Called by Death.

DEATH CAME AT CHIHUAHUA CITY

Was An Exile in United States for Seven Years; Was at One Time Worth \$40,000,000.

EL PASO, Texas, June 15.—General Luis Terrazas died today at his home in Chihuahua City, Mexico.

General Luis Terrazas, once one of the greatest cattle kings of Mexico, lost almost all his fortune in the Villa revolution and became an exile in the United States in 1913. In 1920, he returned to what was left of his estates near Chihuahua City and recovered possession of most of his holdings in the vicinity of that city including one of his palatial homes.

At the height of his fortune, General Terrazas is said to have owned 5,000,000 to 7,000,000 acres of land in Chihuahua and his wealth was estimated at \$40,000,000. He owned great herds of cattle.

Francisco Villa, confederated all his estates and killed his stock. General Terrazas' friends have said that the general prayed to outlive the former bandit chieftain so that he might "follow Villa into the next world and there denounce him for his sins."

Terrazas was 84 years old when he was compelled to flee from Mexico with his family. For six years, he lived in El Paso, Texas, some of the time at the home of A. B. Hall, then United States senator and later Secretary of the Interior. Subsequently, he lived for about a year in Los Angeles with 23 members of his family.

When he returned to Chihuahua in 1921, he undertook with the aid of his two sons, Juan and Alberto Terrazas, to rebuild his fortune, stock his ranges, and accumulate settlers for his best land.

Meantime, the government had claimed many thousands of acres of the land he formerly owned on the ground that he had lost title to it under the law that land is subject to confiscation unless it is filled. Much of it was distributed among poor.

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CARROLL GETS JAIL SENTENCE

At ten o'clock this morning in the circuit court Judge J. W. Knowles sentenced Charles Carroll, found guilty of contributing to the delinquency of a child, to six months servitude in the county jail.

The case of the State of Oregon vs. Frank Fox, charged with taking stolen articles knowingly, was completed yesterday when the jury returned with a verdict of guilty but asked the court that mercy be shown in passing sentence. Fox will be sentenced tomorrow morning at ten o'clock in the circuit court.

Today the case of Nera Short vs. the State Industrial Accident Commission is being tried. The plaintiff is suing the defendant on a claim for injuries sustained by Earl Short a year ago.
